THE NEW PERTH DAIRYING CO.—The Annual Meeting was held on the 19th inst. The Annual Report showed that a good year's work had been done, the butter manufactured being 25 per cent more than last season, the total value 36 per cent greater than in 1924. The directors have now on hand about \$1100, which puts them in a position to make some desired improvements in the equipment, etc. The following were appointed directors viz: Wm. Moar, J. A. Dewar, C. H. McQuarrie, J. J. Walsh, Thos. McLean, O. Collins, R. G. McLaren, R. S. McLaren, President, Wm. Cain, Secretary, D. McLaren, Auditor. The directors will meet on Saturday to plan for the current year.

CHANGE IN LETTER CARRIER DELIVERY.—Owing to complaints having been received regarding the non-delivery of mail by letter carriers on Saturday afternoons it has been decided to make a change in the present service, so that in future the carriers will be entitled to their half-holiday on Wednesday instead of Saturday and that on Saturday there shall be only one delivery, but the carriers would be required to report for duty at the post office on the arrival of the mail at or about 6.30 p.m., which will be at once fully assured and the carriers' wickets would then be opened at or about 8.30 p.m. and would remain open until 10.00 p.m. so that the patrons receiving their mail through the carrier system would have the privilege of obtaining their mail on Saturday nights only by calling at the Carriers' Wickets. This new service will go into operation commencing on Saturday next the 23rd inst.

ST. ANDREW'S KIRK, SAINT JOHN.—The annual meeting of St. Andrew's Kirk, United Church of Canada, Saint John, N. B. was held Wednesday night, January 20th. Reports from fifteen organizations of the Church were received and adopted. The financial returns for both local work and budget were the largest in the history of the Church. Thirty new families united with the Church during the year. Budget of \$1400. An increase of 1926 was reported and a total increase of fifty per cent over 1925 was pledged for all revenues. The meeting voted a salary increase of six hundred dollars a year to the minister, Rev. J. S. Bonnell.

On November 21st, 1925, His Honour replied as follows: "To the Acting Secretary of State: 'I have the honour to acknowledge the telegram of the Under Secretary of State of the 20th instant, informing me of the death of Her Majesty Queen Alexandra, and have to request that you will convey to Their Most Gracious Majesties my deep sympathy and sorrow of myself and loyal subjects in this Province on the passing of our beloved Queen Saviour.' The following letter has been sent to His Honour from Ottawa under date of January 9th, 1926. Sir: I am desired by His Excellency the Governor General to inform you that he has received a despatch from the Secretary of State for Dominion Affairs to the effect that your message of condolence on the occasion of the death of Her Majesty Queen Alexandra was received at Buckingham Palace. The Man in Charge

Dr. G. Emms Smith, in charge of the Station, is a graduate of the University of Toronto. He is a native of Great Britain and received his academic training in this country having lived for over 25 years in Canada. He served on the staff of the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph and also for several years carried out several nutritional problems for the United States Government in the Western States. He was later connected with the Institute of Public Health at London, Ontario at the same time attending to the Pathological Chemistry for Military District No. 1. During the last five years he has been with the Advisory Council for Scientific Research, having charge of research work in connection with the raising of silver foxes in captivity. Dr. Smith has been through a large number of ranches here and in other parts of Canada, giving a great deal of attention to the requirements of the proper feeding of foxes and through the information disseminated as the outcome of his observations and experiments he has the satisfaction of noting a great improvement in the general health and quality of foxes.
