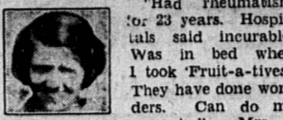

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**Bovril Limited Set New Sales Record**

Chairman Gives Credit to Advertising, which prevents "that sinking feeling" in sales.

Presiding at the thirty-third Annual General Meeting of Bovril Limited, held recently at River Plate House, London, the Chairman, Lord Luke, is reported in the London Times as saying that not only did the sales of Bovril in 1929 surpass all previous records, but the increase was at an accelerated pace. The year showed a larger increase over its predecessor than any previous year with the one exception of 1919, when conditions were abnormal.

Although advertising was considerably larger, their additional sales were many times the amount of the extra advertising, so they had no cause for complaint.

One of the problems with which the Company would be faced in the not far distant future would be that of securing adequate supplies of first quality beef. Serious steps, he felt, would have to be taken to increase the quantity and improve the quality of the beef the Dominions could in future spare for Great Britain.

**DETERMINATION OF SEX**

BERLIN, March 12.—(British United Press)—The claim to have, at any rate, half solved the great problem of pre-natal determination of sex is put forward, with all the modesty and diffidence becoming to a true scientist, by Professor F. Unterberger in a contribution to the German Medical Weekly.

The professor is the head of the gynaecological department of the Charly Hospital of Konigsberg, where his observations were made. His contentions are based on the treatment of fifty-three cases.

In fifty-two of these a son was born, and in the only exception was subsequently shown that his prescription had not been closely followed. So far, the professor pretends ability only to decide definitely that a child shall be of a male sex.

He believes, however, that if his theoretical inferences from the results he has attained should prove correct, they will lead naturally to the pre-determination of daughters as well as sons.

At the outset Professor Unterberger's researches appear to have been purely empirical. It was known to him that sterility in cows had apparently been overcome by scientific treatment with solutions of bicarbonate of soda. He decided to try this substance in his treatment of human patients suffering from the same defect.

His success was complete, and he was soon struck by the fact that all children born in cases which had been treated in this manner were of the male sex. From this he concluded that the treatment itself must have been the determining factor.

Trials made with patients desirous of male offspring went as far as was possible in the circumstances to prove that his inference was correct. It may be recalled that analogous trials with members of the lower creation, such as sea-urchins, frogs and crabs, had already led biologists to the conclusion that pre-determination of sex is only a question of nutritional or similar influences on the embryonic organs.
