Mr. A. J. Jardine of Charlottetown was the guest of his sister Mrs. George Jay of Borden on Tuesday last.

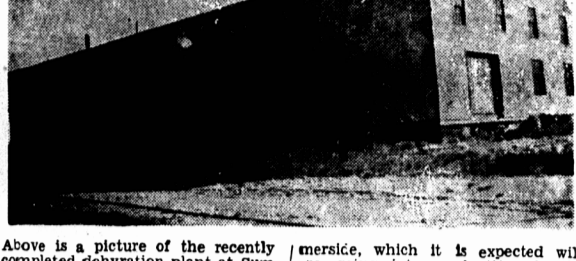

Royal Canadian Engineers Honored On Return From Service At Gibraltar

By ROSS MUNRO (Canadian Press War Correspondent) - SOMEWHERE IN ENGLAND, April 20 (CP)—(Advance)—Royal Canadian engineers of tunnelling companies which worked for the last two years to improve Gibraltar defences were honored here at a ceremony when they were presented with special watch jobs by the army commander, Lt.-Gen. A.G.L. McNaughton.

All the Canadians are back from the Rock now, having completed their particular job, and 267 of them paraded in their southern England camp to receive sterling silver fobs bearing a key representing the key of Gibraltar and an engraving of the Rock and a hard-rock miner with his power drill. On the reverse side were names of the recipients.

The watch fobs were donated by Hon. C. D. Howe, Canadian Minister of Munitions and Supply, himself an engineer who has followed closely the work of the Canadian Sappers.

Speaking to the troops, Gen. McNaughton said "you have left your mark on the Gibraltar which is a Gibraltar and contributed greatly to strengthen that very important imperial post."

What might be termed the opening gun of the Fourth Victory Loan in Summerside was fired last evening when the first public meeting of the drive was held in the high school auditorium, Summerside.

Mr. Walter E. Darby, County chairman presided and stated in his opening remarks that the people of P.E.I. were asked to raise the largest sum of money in the history of the Province, a staggering sum of two million five hundred thousand dollars; that Prince County was expected to raise the sum of nine hundred thousand dollars. He said that when he first heard the amount he was of the opinion that it was perhaps impossible but after attending the salesmen's convention in the afternoon he had a deep seated conviction that "we shall not fail" for at that meeting he saw unbounded enthusiasm prevail among the assembled salesmen.

He ended his remarks by saying that "we must consider the sacrifices made by our fighting forces and measure our sacrifices by theirs."

Mr. R. Allen, who introduced the speaker of the evening, Lieut. MacMillan, gave an outline of the plans for the trophy in which Summerside as well as all other centres across Canada is competing in the many window displays by the different Summerside merchants. A monster rally will then be held at the school in the evening. He stated that at Kensington last night that they expected to raise the sum of one hundred thousand dollars, although their objective is only half that amount.

Lieut. Robert MacMillan, the speaker of the evening, in his general remarks said he felt quite sure that Summerside and the County would more than reach their objective. He gave a most interesting account of the various methods of minesweeping and in a clear way explained the method by which the Navy deals with mines, magnetic mines in particular. He interspersed his remarks with many humorous anecdotes which occurred during his service in Africa.

A hearty vote of thanks was moved by Donald Baker which was seconded by Mr. Huet Morrison and presented to Lieut. MacMillan by the chairman Mr. W. E. Darby. Three excellent moving pictures were shown by B. G. Rogers of the P.E.I. Travel Bureau. Perhaps the most interesting of these was "one day of war" which depicted the heroic war efforts of the Russian army and the people of the Soviet Union in their fight against Nazi invasion.

Canning Sugar For "Quota Users"

Sugar for canning may be obtained by about 7,000 institutions in Canada now listed among the "quota users", officials of the Ration Administration declared yesterday. Application forms will be available at the Branches of the Ration Administration early next week. They must be filled and entered at the nearest Branch not later than April 30th.

Boarding houses, hospitals, penal institutions, boarding schools, and religious institutions are included among the quota users for which canning sugar will be supplied. Any of these now operating outside the quota system are supposed to obtain canning sugar in the same manner as the ordinary consumer.

There is no provision under this system, however, for canning sugar for restaurants, hotels, canteens, staff dining rooms, boats, camps and clubs not residential.

The ration administration officials reminded the prospective applicants that the home canning application cards from the ration books of each individual in the institutions must be attached to the main application card. The names and ration book serial numbers of these individuals must be written on their application cards.

What poundage will be accorded to the institutions will not be decided until all applications have been received and the total quantity of sugar demanded is compared with the amount available for this purpose.
