A MONTREAL dispatch of yesterday says:—Dr. Parkin, Commissioner for the Rhodes Scholarship, received at McGill University yesterday, the report of the Oxford examiners upon the papers of candidates examined on April 13 and 14. The candidates were those in the United States and those in attendance at colleges in Canada, not in affiliation with the University of Oxford. One hundred and twenty, or about one third of the candidates, succeeded in passing in the Dominion one candidate has passed from Prince Edward Island, two from Manitoba, one from North West Territories, two from British Columbia. The other candidates from these provinces are excused the qualifying examination as graduates of affiliated colleges. Candidates have qualified from all the States in the union offering candidates, except Arizona, Florida, Mississippi and Nevada. There was no candidate from New Mexico, and no scholarship was offered in the Indian Territory.
