

CLEVER WORK OF DETECTIVES

BERLIN, Dec. 21 (Special)—An amusing story, told somewhat at the expense of the Colombian (South American) detective force, has caused merry moments in Berlin. A warrant is out for the arrest of Bruning, a young clerk who suddenly left his employment in Berlin, and then was charged with having taken \$65,000 with him.

In Germany, where many things are out of the ordinary, the warrant of arrest entails an accompanying advertisement of the fugitive that makes the man's face almost as well known as that of the most popular actor or opera-singer.

Of the clerk Bruning the police were able to collect no fewer than six photographs. A few hundred of these multi-photographs were then sent to the police of the world.

South America was not forgotten, and even the police of the Government of Columbia learned something of the facial features of the Berlin clerk Bruning. But, apparently, they learned very little, for the other day the Berlin detective office received a courteous note, in which they read: "We have the honor to inform you that we have arrested, and now hold at your disposition, five of the criminals whose photographs you have forwarded us. We are on the track of the sixth, and hope to arrest him shortly."

FOOT AND MOUTH CATTLE DISEASE

LONDON, Dec. 21 (Special)—A situation fraught with the greatest gravity to British stockbreeders has been created by the discovery of suspected foot-and-mouth diseases among animals landed at Wallasey, Birkenhead, from Newry, Ireland. All importations from Ireland have been stopped by order of the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, and the most rigid precautions are being exercised here and in Ireland to stop the spread of the disease. There are loud protests in Ireland on the part of breeders and dealers that the action now taken in preventing exports from that country is unnecessarily drastic, the matter was dealt with at some length in the house of Commons.

ALWAYS CONSULT THE PHONE DIRECTOR

It is surprising the large number of people in Charlottetown who, when they want to inquire about their Morning Daily Guardian or subscription, ask Central for the News phone No. 132.3, instead of 132.2; or when they want to inquire about advertising ask Central for the Subscription phone No. 132-2, or for the News phone No. 132, instead of 132-3; or when they want the News or Editorial Department ask Central for the Subscription phone No. 132-2, instead of 133, although all those departments and their respective phone numbers are plainly given in the telephone book. Some people, instead of looking at the book, even phone one of the above departments to find out what number to ask for to get another department. All this is a great waste of time on the part of the person phoning, the operator at the Central, and the clerk in the department wrongly phoned. The news staff, on an upper floor, cannot give the necessary information about either advertising or subscriptions, nor the advertising staff about subscriptions or news, nor the subscription staff about advertising or news. In other words the clerks know and can do but their own work in their own departments, and if it were otherwise they would be continually running from one department to another, upstairs and down, mixing work, wearing themselves out and causing the greatest possible confusion. On and after 6 p. m. daily it is useless to ask for any phone numbers except 132 and 133.

Patrons who consult their phone books for the numbers they really want will greatly lessen the work of the patient Central telephone and Guardian clerks and thus help make their lives much brighter and happier.

FOR PRESERVING CHURCH BUILDINGS

TO PRESERVE ANCIENT FOREST

PARIS, Dec. 21 (Special)—A deputation recently waited on N. Pams, Minister of Agriculture, in order to ask him to take immediate steps to prevent the sale of the famous forest of En, near Dieppe, to timber merchants, and the consequent destruction. The forest, which comprises 25,250 acres, belongs to the Orleans family, but it is hoped that the domain may be acquired by the State. M. Pams promised to look into the matter.

Communes May Subscribe Funds to Aid in Keeping Their Church in Best Conditions

PARIS, Dec. 21 (Special)—M. Maurice Barres, the Academician, has long been carrying on a generous campaign in favor of preserving churches other than religious monuments from the ravages of time. A few days ago he eloquently pleaded in the Chamber of Deputies for the cause of thousands of churches with their delightful little grey spires so familiar to tourists, forming together a national treasure of artistic beauty. Since the Law of Separation the care of churches, "Calvaries," and all religious monuments is no longer obligatory upon anybody. Each commune is left a certain measure of liberty, but even if the faithful subscribe they are at the mercy of some fierce Radical or Atheist mayor or municipality. M. Barres gave a few instances, which could be multiplied by scores. At Moulins-les-Moyers, in the Department of the Yonne, a "Calvary," a perfect gem of eighteenth century art, is crumbling away because the municipal council refuses money offered by private individuals for its preservation. At Borneil a twelfth century church is falling to ruins. The sum of \$3,000 was collected, but a village grocer objected to its acceptance. The remedy proposed to the Chamber by M. Barres is that the communes should be freely permitted to subscribe to keep up the churches without being obliged, while the faithful should be allowed to collect separately, and the State should contribute a sum equal to the total result of one or both of these sources.

FINANCES OF PORTUGAL

LISBON, Dec. 21 (Special)—General agreement is expressed in the Press that the present financial situation is serious. The "Seculo" considers it bad but not desperate. The Legationist "Macao" lays stress on the Finance Minister's statement that the Republicans have made a mistake in hitherto deceiving the nation concerning national finance. The Evolutionist "Republica" expresses alarm at the projected increases of taxation.

GERMAN PRINCE TO VISIT CANADA

LONDON, Dec. 21 (Special) A report is published here to the effect that subject to the consent of the Emperor William, the German Crown Prince proposes to go early next year for a shooting expedition in Canada and the United States. It is understood that the estrangement which has recently existed between His Imperial Majesty and the Crown Prince has to a large extent disappeared, and Berlin gossip attributes this improvement in Imperial personal relations to the influence of the Empress.

PARTIES IN RUSSIAN DUMA

ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 21 (Special)—The distribution of parties in the Duma, in the final returns, gave 163 members to the Right, 144 Nationalists and Octobrists to the Centre, and 125 members to the Left. Since then the Right has undergone a rapid process of disintegration into various shades, the great majority grouping themselves as "Moderates," and the Right properly speaking now said to consist of 33. On the other hand the Moderate Right are to some extent combining with the Nationalists. If this process develops the Octobrist Party will, as in the preceding Duma, be compelled to seek temporary alliances as time and opportunity require. But the talk of the Octobrist Centre will presumably be a much more difficult one in the present House. At any rate, the dream of a stable Centre remains a dream.

The elections were greatly influenced by clerical and bureaucratic interference. Unprejudiced observers in all the provinces report that the Opposition spirit (and by "opposition" in this sense is meant dissatisfaction with the delay in reforms as distinct from a desire to be identified with the parties that sit on the Left) pervades all classes of the community. The gain of 112 seats by the Right in the provinces was achieved entirely by the vote of the parish priests, who in many cases acted under orders. In the large cities, however, notably in Moscow and St. Petersburg, the Octobrist candidates were defeated by Cadets or Progressives, because the city voter, being naturally more advanced in his views than the provincial, disapproved of the accommodating tactics adopted by the Octobrists under M. Gouchevko in the Third Duma.

In Poland the city elections turned entirely on the Jewish question. The Jews in Warsaw succeeded in defeating M. Roman Dmowski, the National Democratic leader, who had proclaimed himself against any rights being given to the Jews. They elected a Socialist workman. In Lodz they elected a Jew.

The Government has prepared a long list of urgent reform measures, dealing with every department of the administration, notably in the extension of the principle of local government.

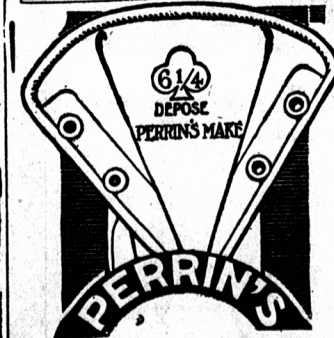
