BASEBALL #31 . . . HITTING TRICKS

FOOT POSITION
Stand at plate with feet same distance apart as distance between finger tips and elbow. Measure carefully. This is perfect hitting stance. Always use it.

CHOKE GRIP
To hit fast pitching, especially fast fastballs, stand back in batters' box and use "choke" grip with top hand, as shown in the illustration above.

STEP IN
Before you swing—take short, quick step forward. Place all weight on front foot. Move smoothly. Always keep your eye on the ball. This is important.
