BEATTY WARNS WEST OF LOW PRICE WAVE

REGINA, Sept. 12.—Low wheat prices must be expected for some time by the Western farmer, counselled E. W. Beatty, K.C., president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, in Regina today. He believed that cost of production is what must be taken

under consideration, and farmers must learn to operate units large enough to carry the overhead of expensive machinery.

According to Mr. Beatty's opinion, the Canadian farmer will be more efficient and will produce wheat eventually at a lower selling cost than his competitors.

B. C. Coleman, vice-president in charge of Western lines, mentioned that continuation of the present unusually heavy grain movement depends on export demand. He admitted that plans for a new railway station in Regina were in the hands of the company's engineers, but would say nothing further.

DONALD MACKINNON

An old and highly respected resident of Westmorland County, Donald MacKinnon, retired farmer, died at his home at Scotch Settlement late Saturday night at the advanced age of 94 years. He had enjoyed splendid health up until Tuesday

morning when he was stricken with paralysis.

The late Mr. MacKinnon was born in Prince Edward Island on September 20, 1836, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Laughlin MacKinnon, and thus lived during the reigns of four British sovereigns. When nine years of age he removed with his parents to New Brunswick, locating at Scotch Settlement, they being among the original settlers there. He was a successful farmer in that district practically all his life, retiring from active work some years ago, and for 35 years filled the office of Postmaster. He always took a deep interest in all affairs pertaining to the welfare of the community and province and was much esteemed by a wide circle of friends and acquaintances. He was a life long member of the Presbyterian afterwards the United Church of Canada at Scotch Settlement.

The late Mr. MacKinnon was a widower, his wife having died 27 years ago. He is survived by five sons, John, of Reidfield, Maine; Laughlin, C. N. R. Shops Foreman; and Alex., also of the C. N. R. shops staff, Moncton; Absolom and Daniel, at home. One brother, Angus, of Deadham, Mass., and one sister, Mrs. Jessie Connolly, of New York, also survive.—Moncton Transcript.

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
