 General Assembly Of Irish Church Opens At Belfast—Scenes Of Inspiring Enthusiasm.

 BELFAST, June 16—Only those who have visited the Emerald Isle have any idea of the warmth and sincerity of an Irish welcome. Arriving just in time for the opening of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, one had only to present his credentials as the delegate from the Presbyterian Church in Canada to be received with open arms and to be assured that all the good things Northern Ireland possessed were ours for the asking. Nature herself beamed with a broad Irish smile. The Irish Sea, proverbial for its boisterous weather and tumultuous waves, was most considerate as we passed from Stranraer to Larne. A glorious sunset gave its benediction as we entered the Lough. And at the dock friends awaited the arrival of commissioners, greeting everyone with happy laughter and a grip of the hand that meant more than Irish words with all their eloquence.  
 Reaching the city of Belfast (emphasis on the last syllable please) we find ourselves in the midst of a teeming city of life, and moving with a throng of the cheeriest people under the sun. In fact anyone who does not feel at home immediately on arrival in Ulster must have a heart of stone. And if

Suddenly the door at the right of the spacious platform opens. A robed official appears and in stentorian tones proclaims "The Moderator!" As by magic every one of the audience of four thousand rises, and stands silent to attention. Unfailing respect is shown to a Moderator. With great dignity and faultlessly robed in his official gown, knee breeks, silk stockings and buckled shoes, lace collar and cuffs, and his brilliantly colored academic hood denoting the degree of Doctor of Divinity, the Right Reverend J. G. Paton, the retiring Moderator enters, accompanied by the Very Reverend Dr. Watson, Clerk of Assembly and other distinguished office bearers of this great historic church of Ireland. Needless to say the devotional service preceding the election of the new Moderator was inspiring. We had heard the old Psalm tunes sung in Assemblies in England, Wales and Scotland but none surpassed these Irish Presbyterians who warbled the low notes and the high of "Old Hundred" and "French," and especially "Irish" with a fluency, vigor and melody, assuring the listener that it is as natural for these loyal Ulster folk to sing the Psalms of David as it is to breathe the invigorating air of this fair Emerald Isle.  
 The sermon by Dr. Paton as retiring Moderator was eloquent, earnest and timely. He is a nephew of the great missionary Dr. J. G. Paton of the South Seas; and both in form and content his message was eminently worthy of his heritage. Upon the Reverend J. J. Macaulay, D. D., of Dublin fell the honor of being elected to preside over the Assembly and the Moderator for the ensuing year. His nomination by a large majority of Presbyterians and the announcement that the committee appointed to recommend his election had unanimously agreed so to do, were greeted with vigorous and prolonged applause.  
 The popularity of such a recommendation was very evident by the tremendous approval by both men and women having seats in the galleries and the loud cheering of those in the corridors of Assembly Hall unable to gain admission. How wonderfully well these Irish people can express themselves either pro or con. The new Moderator entered with dignified bearing, but with great modesty, and being welcomed by his predecessors in office while the vast audience stood then bowed to those immediately in front, then to right and to the left, and receiving from the Commissioners a graceful bow in return, advanced to address the court. It was several moments before the tumultuous

applause from all sides permitted him to proceed. But his address was listened to with rapt attention, as he delivered it with his cultured Irish voice and faultless English diction to which impressiveness was added by his imposing physique and inspiring personality. No wonder that these Irish Presbyterians from Ulster and the Free State likewise were proud of their Moderator and exuberant in loyalty to such a Church.  
 Weighty matters engaged the attention of the fathers and brethren as they settled down to business next morning. There were evident signs that a battle for some great principle was soon to be staged. Ecclesiastical warriors were getting ready their shillalaws of logic and eloquence. An appeal against the decision of the three lower courts was the first order of the day. The Moderators urged that the case be heard in private or in committee. The unpopularity of such a suggestion was at once expressed by cries of "No! The galleries were again crowded. How these most lovable Irish folk delight in a scrap in the open. The Moderator declared the mind of the court to favor the hearing of the appellant and defendants in open court. All parties were heard.  
 It was a case of a Sabbath School superintendent appealing against the action of a Session refusing to allow him to have full control of the school and limiting his authority to appoint certain teachers to his staff. The Moderator's rulings throughout the debate were admirably impartial. He was courteous and firmness personified. Feeling was tense, but every speaker was given an excellent hearing. The rapid firing of the young Irish minister with ruddy hair and gleaming eye as he spoke in defence of his Session's action and in fiery eloquence called a spade a spade, but never overstepped the bounds of order nor gave utterance to his volleys of facts in language unparliamentary will long be remembered. Long time as the case occupied it was evident that the debate served to clear the atmosphere; and the result of it all was that the appeal was dismissed.  
 The decision was accepted with true Irish grace. No one apparently questioned the finding of the Court; and many of the opponents in the debate met later in the corridors, grasped each other by the hand in friendliest manner and had lunch together at the hotel. None but the Irish could bring such keen and vigorous discussion to so happy a conclusion unless it be a Scottish Assembly. These leaders of the Church militant are past masters in keen debate and loyal friendship.
