The last meeting in the winter course of the Natural History and Antiquarian Society, held last night, proved to be one of the most interesting. John Clark, B. A., read a paper upon the Life of this Planet, treating first of different kinds of matter, and of its arrangement in living forms. This was followed by a history of the progress of botanical life from the earliest geological times, to the present, and description of the plants constituting the different divisions treated of in the Science of Botany. Similarly history of animal life, from its first appearance upon this earth up to the present time was given in detail. The lecture was illustrated by a number of drawings and was most favorably commented upon by the president and Messrs. Bayson, McSwain, and Ross. A vote of thanks was tendered the lecturer upon motion of John McSwain, seconded by John Newson.

A MEETING of the P. E. Island Lord's Day Alliance was held yesterday afternoon at which the question of operating trolley cars on Sunday in Charlottetown and vicinity was the principal topic. Very strong feeling was expressed against the proposed Sunday cars, and also that the Legislature, if within its power, ought to have enacted a clause to prevent it. While there may be doubt in some minds as to the question of jurisdiction, it was observed that the Dominion Parliament expressly confers power upon the Provincial Legislatures to regulate or prohibit the operation of street-car traffic on Sunday. An advance step in the Alliance work has recently been taken. The four western Provinces have appointed a secretary for work arising within their bounds. This set free Mr. Moore who had previously been giving a part of his time to the West. Consequently he has been appointed Secretary for Eastern Canada, including P. E. I. Rev. J. G. Shearer still retains general oversight of the work as Sec'y of the I. L. A. of Canada.

IT IS ALMOST CIVIL WAR

WARSAW, Poland, April 18.—The religious troubles between the Catholics and Marivits, the new Catholic sect, in many places in Poland are assuming a very serious phase. Indeed the situation has almost reached the dignity of civil war. At Luptsi 3,000 Marivits attacked 2,000 Catholics and a regular pitched battle followed, during which three men were killed and forty wounded. The fighting is proceeding today. At Lubon constant skirmishes are in progress and several persons have been killed or wounded. Last week at Charkew, the Marivits, who are in the majority there took possession of a church and insisted on the reappointment of a priest who was dismissed by the Catholics.

INTEGRITY OF BRITISH EMPIRE

LONDON, April 18.—In proposing the health of Sir John Forrest, treasurer of Australia, at a dinner in his honor, Lord Strathcona said the various colonies had a community of interest, and although a friendly rivalry existed between them, they mutually desired each other's prosperity and would unite for the general prosperity of the Empire. Sir John Forrest said that Lord Strathcona sounded a true note when he spoke of the sympathy existing between the constituent nations of the Empire. Whether they belonged to Canada, South Africa, Australia, New Zealand or any part of the British possessions, their watchword was the maintenance of the integrity of the Empire. The sentiment, however, was not now sufficient to bind us together. He felt that unity must be maintained on a commercial basis.
