Report of the General Secretary For the Month of March 1925

To the President and Members of the Board of Directors, Sirs:

The month of March was a month just full of activity all the time. Attendance at the various caucuses were very encouraging. No outstanding events took place during March, but the usual program was going to the limit.

Student Meetings—After a break of four weeks caused by sickness, the regular Saturday night socials were continued with very good attendance of about 200 each night.

Bible Study Groups—Two new groups were organized this month one from Prince of Wales College composed of both boys and girls 35 in number under the leadership of Prof. G. D. Steele. The other group is strictly from our own members and is in the form of a discussion group and has 13 attending.

It is meeting for a special caucus for a period of six weeks. H.Y. Club—This club held two meetings during the month and was then disbanded for the season.

Sir William S. Glyn-Jones, Coming To Canada

Sir William Samuel Glyn-Jones is expected to arrive on a visit to Canada about the 6th of April. He intends giving an address on price maintenance to the retail drug trade in each of the Canadian cities. He is recognized as the greatest of authorities on this subject and will no doubt attract a very large attendance in each of the cities.

Sir William S. Glyn-Jones commenced his business life as a pharmacist but has since become a Barrister-at-law having been called to the Bar Middle Temple in 1904.

He has been Secretary of the Pharmaceutical Society of Great Britain since 1918. He was the originator and has been Secretary for 29 years of the Proprietary Articles Trade Association of Great Britain. This is the association that was formed to protect the mutual interests of the three sections of the trade, namely the manufacturers, the wholesalers and the retailers.

The P. A. T. A. has operated continuously for 29 years and now numbers 444 manufacturers, every wholesaler in Great Britain and 7250 retailers.

Sir William has held the following public positions.— He has been J. P. and an Alderman of Middlesex County Council. M. P. for Steyne (L).

He was Parliamentary Private Secretary to the Minister of Munitions in 1916, and to the Minister of Reconstruction in 1917.

He is the author of "The Law of Poisons and Pharmacy" which was published in 1894 to Mary, daughter of John Evans of Llanfyllter, Carthmarchenshire. His residence is Glenhurst, Sutton Common Road, Sutton, Surrey.
