Gets Destroyer As First Command

A NEWFOUNDLAND PORT, Jan. 15 — (AP) — Acting Lt.-Comdr Tom Pullen, Oakville, Ont., member of a famous Canadian Navy family, recently took over his first command as Captain of the destroyer H.M.C.S. Saskatchewan.

The young permanent-force officer is a brother of Comdr. Hugh Pullen, executive officer of the cruiser H.M.C.S. Uganda and former captain of the destroyer Ottawa and senior officer of an ocean group.

For five generations there has always been at least one Pullen in the Naval Service.

Comdr. Pullen joined the Navy in 1906 as a cadet. He served in the British cruisers Shropshire and Sussex and the destroyers Hotspur and Keppel before being appointed to the Canadian destroyer Assiniboine as a sub-lieutenant.

He is survivor of the torpedoing and sinking of the original H.M.C.S. Ottawa in the North Atlantic in September, 1942, when 115 lives were lost. The 76 survivors were picked up by a British corvette.

Comdr. Pullen was officer in charge of the gunnery school at H.M.C.S. Cornwallis in Nova Scotia until June, 1943. Then he became first lieutenant of the destroyer Lincoln C.S. Ondaudiere, leaving her last August after the ship had taken an active role in invasion operations.

Wren Senior Officers Honored

OTTAWA — War-end promotions and the New Year's honours list brought several changes in the ranks of the Women's Royal Canadian Naval Service. The Canadian commander Philip Holroyde, Victoria, B. C. is in charge of the W.R.C.N.S. grating, R.C.N. Depot, Halifax. Acting-Lieutenant Home Currie, Medicine Hat, is W.R.C.N.S. Unit Officer for the H.M.C.S. Bytown, Ottawa, and Acting-Lieutenant Special Agent Helen Ockerden of Victoria, B.C., is Unit Officer for the Wrens at H.M.C.S. Cornwallis, Cornwallis, Nova Scotia.

Pay - Lieutenant - Commander Dorothy Wainwright of Winnipeg is H.M.C.S. Acting-Lieutenant in charge of the ship's office at the Central Victualling Depot in Halifax. Acting-Lieutenant-Commander E.M. Middlejka of Toronto is in charge of cookery schools in the R.C.N.

Only Acting-Lieutenant-Commander in the Special Agent's office of the W.R.C.N.S. is Nancy Fyfer, of Ottawa, who is attached to the staff of the Director, W.R.C.N.S. Lieutenant Edna M. Whitney, of Ottawa, received the M.B.E. in the New Year's list for her work in recruiting for the W.R.C.N.S. prior to her present appointment as assistant to the known strength of 60 at Porto Corini, London.

Making history were two non-commissioned Wrens who received the British Empire Medal. Chief Petty Officer Agnes Frazee, of Verdun, Quebec, in charge of wardroom attendants at the H.M.C.S. King's, a training establishment for naval officers in Halifax, and Petty Officer Margaret J. Davidson of Vancouver, reception clerk and writer in the transportation and accommodation office of the R.C.N. in London, England.

N. S. Highland Unit Advances On Italian Front

WITHE THE CANADIANS ON THE ADRIATIC, Jan. 13 — (Revised) (CP Cable) Canadian troops today captured Sant' Alberto, key town in the enemy's plans for withdrawing from the fast-developing pocket south of Lake Comacchio, and immediately thrust forward a mile to positions commanding the southwest shore of the lake.

Other Canadian troops sped northward to cut off the German escape route along the lake's narrow eastern shore, while farther south Highland units co-operated with British troops in eliminating the enemy bulge over the Senio River northeast of Faenza.

This is Sant' Alberto's second liberation, for early last month it immediately after Ravenna had been taken, it was freed by paratroopers, only to be recaptured by the enemy. This time the civilians were too bomb-dazed to be of much assistance and were found huddled piteously in church and school basements.

The final thrust into Sant' Alberto was made by Nova Scotia troops who occupied the town about firing a shot. In doing so they overran four enemy field guns complete with eight-man crews, ammunition and horses, capturing all without a struggle.

The Nova Scotians, under Capt. Syl McKinnon of Sydney, N. S., were closely followed by tanks. First into the town was a mid-night patrol led by Lieut. Harry Word, Campbellton, N. B., which actually passed an enemy party pulling out.

The regiment swiftly followed the patrol and two hours after the occupation German stragglers were being discovered, literally begging to be taken prisoner. In less than three days the Highlanders bagged 160 captives and killed and wounded as many more.

Meanwhile companies of Ontario troops with the Nova Scotians on the far side of the Bonifica Canal, swung in a northeasterly direction to intercept the enemy's only remaining withdrawal route in this sector — the narrow eastern shore of Lake Comacchio.

Nova Scotia troops under Capt. Harry Boates, Westville, N. S., and Don Chisholm, Great Village, N. S., who outflanked Sant' Alberto yesterday, advanced towards the Reno River, Chisholm and Boates overran three enemy anti-tank guns Thursday afternoon, all complete with ammunition.

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Canadian tank patrols have overtaken retreating German headquarters in the area, and are firing Canadian artillery and supply wagons, shooting them up whenever this occurs.

Along the banks of the Senio opposite Cotigola the enemy now has been almost entirely dislodged by Highlanders under Maj. Cline Mace, Innisfail, Alta., who now are within 200 yards of the river and patrolling forward to its banks.

Highlanders crossed the Vecchio Canal early this morning after a company led by Maj. John Bassett, Montreal, beat off a strong enemy counter-attack late Thursday.

Looking Ahead In Ottawa

OTTAWA, Jan. 13 — (CP) — An Ottawa meeting for the first time since 1945-46 is foreseen in politics circles in the Capital but there is no certainty yet when it will come before Parliament and whether before or after a general election.

While the winding up of the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan will bring a reduction in air force expenditures, army outlays will likely be higher and the intensified fighting of the Western Front if it continues may mean additional outlays for war industrial plants to produce more munitions and equipment.

The overseas army establishment is not expected to be larger but the movement of larger numbers of reinforcements, necessitated by casualties, will result in higher costs. The return of men to Canada on leaves and the care, discharge and rehabilitation of the wounded and unfit will cost more money. Naval expenditures will run about the same as in the present year.

War appropriation bill in the neighborhood of \$3,750,000,000 to \$4,000,000,000 is seen as possible against the appropriation of \$3,650,000,000 for the present year.

Pro workers' Festival of professional workers in Canadian industry under the compulsory collective bargaining terms of the Federal Labor Code will come up for consideration before the National Labor Relations Board this week. Delegates representing professional groups and labor organizations are expected to take part in the hearing. Last April, at its first meeting, the Board gave a tentative decision that professional workers, including engineers and chemists,
