EDITOR'S MAIL.

THE TIME TABLE APPROVED.

Sir,—It would be interesting to know just what Father Burke and The Patriot want in the matter of a Railway Winter Time Table. The East has two regular trains each way daily as has the West during the spring, summer, and autumn, and is satisfied with an express train three days of each week and an accommodation the other three days during the winter, but Father Burke is not content with a similar service West, although the express is a through train each way and thus runs in much faster time than during the summer season when it is but an express part way. The Murray Harbor Branch has never had more than one train each way daily and that an accommodation. How would Father Burke like to live in Murray Harbor? The people of the East and South will not at any time during the winter be able to go to Summerside and return the same day and have to be content with reaching Charlottetown, but Father Burke can three days of each week have two and one half hours in Charlottetown or from four to seven hours or more daily in Summerside and reach his home early the same evening. Does the West really require more train service in the winter or at any other time than the East and South or has Father Burke got a hobby?

I hope The Patriot is not kicking because it cannot reach subscribers unless it catches mail for the West three days of each week at noon and the other three at two p. m. It should remember that both summer and winter there is no morning train to Murray Harbor and none in the winter or at any other time than the East and South or has Father Burke got a hobby?

For my own part I think the new winter time-table an excellent one and by far the best we ever had with but one exception, as you have pointed out in your issue of this morning. The Cape Traverse Train must come direct to Charlottetown, every morning of the week on its arrival at Emerald Junction returning in the afternoon, thus giving people along the line the same privilege of shopping in Charlottetown as does the train which leaves Charlottetown every morning returning in the afternoon give them to shop in Summerside, otherwise Charlottetown business men must feel that they are being discriminated against in the matter of trade and most unfairly dealt with.

In addition to the benefits previously pointed out, the new time-table makes it possible to travel from either end of this Province to the other in one day, or to reach any part of the Province from Pictou in a day. In conclusion my advice to Father Burke and The Patriot is "Be sure you're right, then go ahead."
