Rev. Dr. S. F. Huestis left Halifax, May 17th on a brief visit to his daughter on Prince Edward Island.
O. H. Black, son-in-law of Lt. Col. Moore, a rival in the city Saturday morning from Piquet, N.S.
The Moncton Transcript of the 16th says: Four nice horses came over from Prince Edward Island yesterday.
The Minto arrived at this port Saturday at 10:30 a.m. with 21 passengers, 1 car, 1 bean, 1 car of sugar and 3 cars of hay.
The funeral of the late Mr. A. T. Hobbs took place yesterday afternoon at two o'clock in the Presbyterian cemetery at Georgetown.
Miss Ethel Poole of this city will leave June 5 for a tour of the British Isles. She will be accompanied by her friend, Mrs. Crowell of Halifax, and will be absent until October.
Dr. McNeill returned to the city Saturday from Montreal, where he had a surgical operation performed upon his eyes in that city. Mr. Wise is expected home in about a week's time.
The marriage of Dr. Francis Runon Barley to Miss Jane C. Reid, both of Quincy, Mass., will take place at the home of the bride, June 5. The groom is a son of the late Walter Burke, formerly of Southampton, Prince Edward Island, and a nephew of Dr. J. A. Gordon of Quincy.

Edward H. Mitchell, who has been for some years a member of the staff of the Government Engineer's Office in this City has resigned. On the first of next month he will take up the office of travelling representative for the well known firm of Hyndman & Co., insurance brokers, in Charlottetown, and Lloyds representative for Prince Edward Island. Mr. Mitchell possesses many qualities which make him a very popular man, and in his new office he will doubtless be thoroughly successful. He has hosts of friends who heartily wish him success.

The Michigan Christian Advocate has the following regarding the late Fredrick Strong, no trace of whose death has already appeared in The Guardian: "He was born at St. John, N. B., Feb. 20, 1832. His father was the first Methodist minister in Montreal or Quebec, having been sent over from England by the British conference. Bro. Strong received his special training for the ministry in the Sackville academy. He was married to Miss Sarah Douie, June 12, 1853, at Charlottetown, P. E. I. Eleven children were born to them, ten of whom are living and nine were present at the funeral. Bro. Strong preached for more than fifty years, the first part of his ministry being in Prince Edward Island. In 1872 he came to Michigan, and joined the Detroit conference. His first appointment was Reese, Saginaw county, and his after ones the following churches: Tuscola, St. Charles, Bennington, Perry, Byron, Wallad Lake, Osceola, Negaunee, Norway, Oakley and Bennington a second term, from which place he superannuated seven years ago last fall. Since superannuation he has supplied one year at Hartland. Bro. Strong did not cease work for the Master, but continued to labor cheerfully and acceptably in the various activities of the church. He preached both morning and evening only three weeks ago, April 14, at Milford and was in the pulpit the Sunday before he died and assisted in the service. He taught a large Bible class in the Sunday school. He was a somewhat retiring man, not taking part in conference debate and not pushing himself into notice at any gathering. In his own pastorate he was full of energy and action; and his warm-hearted nature and ardent words and glowing feeling made him a very effective public speaker, a good revivalist and a successful and greatly beloved pastor. Mrs. Strong, who was so greatly shocked at the sudden death of her husband is much broken physically and mentally under the strain, but is bearing her sorrow bravely."

Angus McKenzie who was appointed janitor of the Post Office in place of the late J. W. Fraser, entered upon his duties yesterday Mr. McKenzie has been night watchman at the Post Office for the past eleven years. Patrick McKenna succeeds him as night watchman.
The death occurred at Wood Islands, May 16, of Charles Brown, aged 72, unmarried, brother of Captain Angus Brown, of the S. S. Stanley, and of Mr. Angus McPherson, Wood Islands. The interment took place at two o'clock Saturday afternoon in Wood Islands cemetery.
An exchange says: Five year old Erlie Frederickson, son of Mrs. Henry Frederickson of Charlottetown, became separated from his mother in St. John on Tuesday, and was lost for six hours finally turning up weeping at the railway station. Mrs. Frederickson and six children none of them over nine years, were on their way to Regina. Erlie's adventure meant the loss of a day.
The death took place Saturday at the City Hospital of William Cotton, who had been confined to the hospital since March 16th. He was throughout his life a resident of Port Hill and was seventy-three years of age. His body was forwarded in the afternoon to Port Hill to be laid beside the body of his wife who predeceased him several years ago. The late Mr. Cotton leaves a number of children who are living in the United States.

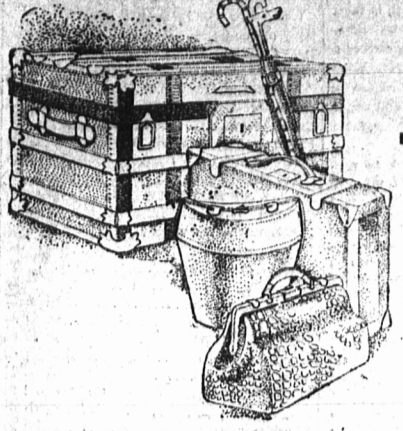
