FEWER THEOLOGICAL STUDENTS.

The decrease in the number of divinity students in American and Canadian colleges has from time to time formed the subject of newspaper comment and has been discussed at the annual conventions of various religious bodies. The same drift away from the ministry has been noted in Great Britain and on the Continent. For several years the Established Church of England has found its supply of clergymen growing fewer, and not long ago a series of letters was published in the London Spectator discussing the dearth of Candidates for Holy Orders.

This wide-spread and general experience of theological colleges and seminaries is not to be accounted for by the dejection of religious faith. The fact is that the number of honorable callings which a young man may seek has been greatly increased in recent years. Formerly there were but three learned professions commonly spoken of, divinity, the law and medicine. Now we have in the numberless branches of business a much wider field. Engineering alone attracts hundreds to one or other of its subdivisions, civil, mechanical, hydraulic or electrical; mining, manufacturing, architecture literature, journalism and art each offer their prizes of good positions or remuneration to those who possess the requisite attainments. Science has enormously enlarged the field of medicine and surgery. In fact all other professions have widened their field while of theology alone little more is known or taught than was known and taught hundreds of years ago.

It is easy to see that the field for occupation for learning and talent has been so much enlarged that the Gospel ministry is not perhaps so eagerly sought for as a life calling as it was at a former period. Possibly this may even be a blessing in disguise. Men of the best talents will still enter the ministry when impelled thereto by a strong sense of duty, and these are obviously of the class most desirable and most likely to be useful. Nor is there yet any notable dearth of ministers in the world. There are still about as many ministers in most countries as there are churches seeking pastors and willing to maintain them. It can hardly be desirable that there should be a very considerable over supply. In fact the universal law of supply and demand must apply to the teachers of religion as to those in other life callings.

The tariff adopted by the new Commonwealth of Australia is a highly protective one—not so high as that of the United States but higher than the Canadian tariff. Omitting those on tobacco and alcohol, it is said the remaining duties average 30 per cent. This must have a bearing on our trade relations with Australia. Before the union of the far southern Provinces was effected New South Wales was practically a free trade country and her products came within the pale of the preferential tariff in this country. New South Wales has no longer a tariff for itself but is merged in the big Commonwealth which has apparently thrown away the chance of remaining on preferential tariff terms with Canada.

THE AIRSHIP'S PROGRESS.

On Saturday last Santos Dumont successfully performed the feat in which he had before failed, to wing his way from St. Cloud to and around the Eiffel tower in Paris and return. The distance between the two points is four and a quarter miles, and the round trip necessarily covered nine and a half miles. Dumont is reported to have made the trip to the tower with the wind in his favor, and returned against the wind making the entire distance in 30 minutes. The reports tell that there was a breeze of five nine to ten miles an hour. Dumont appears to have made a speed of 30 miles an hour while going with the wind and about 12 miles against the wind.

This is very wonderful, if true, demonstrating the practicability of navigating the air in a considerable breeze. Apparently Dumont's airship could make some progress even against a 20 knot wind. Of course he would be comparatively helpless in a gale or a squall, but if he has mastered the ordinary fair weather conditions he has achieved a notable victory. The airship will be more fully perfected in the near future, and may be accepted ten years hence as a matter of course as much as the automobile is today.
