**P. E. Island Hospital Publicity Campaign**

The final formal supper in the Prince Edward Island Hospital campaign was held in the Social Hall of Trinity United Church last Tuesday evening, and an additional total of \$27,903.94 since the preceding Rally was reported by the committees and teams, which carried the grand total to \$185,822.89, representing almost 3,000 subscriptions. Executive Chairman W. F. Tidmarsh made the following address:

"This supper officially closes the campaign. But it does not entirely close it. There still remains much work to be done. The whole Executive of the Campaign will continue to function until the pledges are collected and the Hospital is built.

"The District Chairmen still will function. To each district was given a quota. Some have reached their quotas, some have not. Those who have reached their quotas are asked to remain in office to assist in collecting, if necessary. Those who have not reached their quotas will be asked to continue in office until their quotas are reached and the pledges paid.

"To our Campaign Director we are indebted for the success of our efforts. While we have not reached our objective, we feel that the organization which he has built up will enable us to do so.

"No organization could have been more perfect. No detail that in any way assisted in making the campaign a success was omitted. And we are all very grateful to the Campaign Director for his untiring efforts.

"To all those who have worked in the campaign—and there are many—the Executive tender their most sincere thanks. Their reward will be a new Hospital, modern in every essential, the design and equipment a credit to the Province and a monument to their intensive efforts."

Commander-in-Chief Tidmarsh was cheered to the echo by the large assemblage of volunteer workers.

The largest report of the evening came from the Allied Towns Committee, of which Mr. H. Hooper Horne is Chairman. It was \$15,736.50, making a grand total for the Provincial District Committee thus far of \$32,291.90. Even this splendid night's report, however, did not win a championship banner for Chairman Horne's wings of the organization, as the committees are not permitted to compete with the teams for those trophies.

The championship of the corps was won by Captain Wilfred F. Taylor's team, No. 5, with 3 subscriptions totalling \$5,050. This included the \$5,000 from the Sun Life Assurance Company of Canada obtained through President T. B. McCauley, of Montreal, by Mr. J. A. Moore, of the Commerce Building, who is the corporation's manager here.

Captain George W. McLeod and his "Never Say Die" Team, No. 1, captured the championship of the Men's Division with \$1,229 in 6 subscriptions, including a contribution of \$1,200 from the Orange Lodges and the Orange Ladies of the Province.

Mrs. J. A. MacKenzie, Captain of Team 11, and her fellow team members became champions of the Women's Division by turning in \$1,070.09 in 63 subscriptions. This included \$109.09 in 50 subscriptions obtained by Mrs. Charles H. Black, a member of Team 11, from children in the neighborhood of her home. Mrs. Black was inspired to make this collection by the enthusiasm of her own children, who contributed liberally. Many of the youngsters cheerfully emptied their savings banks to help swell the total, and all of them agreed that they wished to have a share in building the new Hospital.

In all parts of the Hall, expressions of admiration for the mastery yet diplomat way in which Executive Chairman W. F. Tidmarsh had conducted the Campaign were heard. It was the universal opinion that his leadership had been perfect from first to last.

A vote of thanks was moved by the Rev. H. D. Raymond, Vice Chairman of the Allied Towns Committee, and seconded by Memorial Chairman W. K. Rogers, who also is chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Hospital, as follows:

Trinity United Church for the use of the Social Hall.  
The Ladies' Aid of Trinity Church for the use of their tables and dishes.  
The ladies of the different churches and the Ladies' Aid of the Hospital for supplying the supper.  
Miss Lillian Earle and Mr. Roy Quigley for the music.  
Mr. William Storey, custodian of the Hall, for arranging the tables and chairs and assisting the ladies.  
Commander Charles H. Black, speaking for himself and also for Mrs. H. Hooper Horne, Commander of the Women's Division, praised the work of all 20 of the teams in the two divisions. He said their energy and devotion had been wonderful, and accounted for their magnificent results. Commander Black also said that the Campaign Director had been of great aid to all the team captains and other team members in planning and carrying out their work.  
Mr. Donald Nicholson, on the invitation of Executive Chairman Tidmarsh, made a brief but eloquent address in which he quoted Scripture effectively to prove the necessity of helping one's fellow man.
