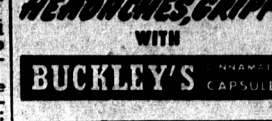
Correspondence was read and discussed. Mrs. Stanley Newman was elected secy-treasurer upon the resignation of Mrs. Ivan Devereaux.

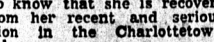
