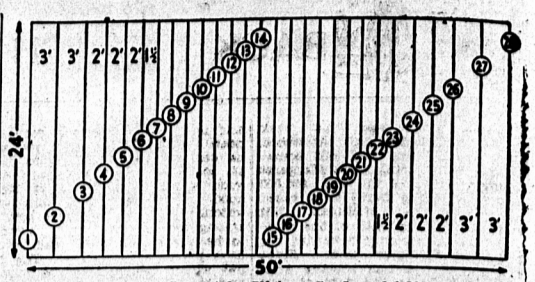

Plan All-Summer Planting to Keep Victory Garden Soil Producing

A well studied Victory garden plan should provide for these points:
1—An all-season harvest, so far as possible, of all the vegetables grown.
2—Production of an abundance of every crop without wasteful surplus, which consume space and work which could be devoted to needed crops.
3—Continuous occupation of the land, so that a maximum yield for the space occupied is produced.



Next, decide on the quantity of each vegetable needed, and the garden space required to produce it. Finally, for all which have a short harvest, total production must be divided into several sowings, so timed that one harvest will follow another, as the first is used up, or its quality falls off.

Efficient Straight-Line Layout for Victory Garden of 1,500 Square Feet. The garden for which this plan was prepared is a rectangular plot, 30 feet wide and 50 feet long. The garden is divided into 15 rows, each 30 feet long and 10 feet wide. The rows are numbered 1 to 15. The plants to be grown in each row are listed in the adjacent table.

The standard application of a balanced plant food is 4 pounds per 100 square feet (a space 10 x 10 feet square). You may figure one pound per plant, so an area 10 by 10 ft. requires two quarts. One quart will feed 50 square feet and one pint 25 square feet.

PLANT FOOD TABLE

Where smaller quantities are required, use a rounded tablespoon per square foot. For convenience, here is a table showing some common areas and the standard balanced plant food application for each:

5' x 5'	requires 1 lb. (or 1 pint)
5' x 10'	equals 50 sq. feet — requires 2 lbs. (or 1 quart)
10' x 10'	equals 100 sq. ft. — requires 4 lbs. (or 2 quarts)
25' x 30'	equals 600 sq. ft. — requires 24 lbs.
25' x 100'	equals 2,500 sq. ft. — requires 100 lbs.
