is being delivered with the utmost speed and intensity.

A very large number of attacks have been made by our flotillas and hunting craft.

The attacks on the German U-boats have been five or six times as numerous as in any equal period in the past. The Prime Minister mentioned last week the figure of six or seven U-boats destroyed. That was not an exaggeration, as an understatement and since then we have had some fruitful and hopeful days.

PROBABLY ONE QUARTER DESTROYED

But even taking six or seven as a safe figure, that is one-tenth of the tonnage of the submarine fleet as it existed at the declaration of war, destroyed during the first fortnight of the war, and probably a third of all the U-boats which have been employed actively.

But the British attack upon the hunting force which was operating at the outbreak of the war, while at the same time the number of targets open to U-boats on the vast tonnage of the sea and air will be greatly reduced by the use of convoys and at the same time the U-boats means of attacking them will be heavily handicapped.

In all this very keen and stern warfare the R. A. F. and the Fleet Air Arm, played an important part in directing the operations of the destroyers upon their quarry and in actually attacking them.

It was to bridge the gap between the sea and the air at the beginning and what we have ready now that the Admiralty decided to use the aircraft carriers with some freedom in order to bring in unimpeded, unorganized and unconvoyed traffic then approaching our shores in large numbers.

Confident of Methods

But this hard stroke of war in no way diminishes our confidence in the methods now at our disposal. On the contrary our confidence in them has grown with every day they have been employed and I believe that their potency will become more apparent in proportion as the great numbers of new vessels come into action and in proportion as our hunting officers get the knack of using depth charges by frequent practice.

Our system of contraband control x x is being perfected and so far as the first fortnight of the war is concerned we are actually our own U-boats and converted to our own use 67,000 tons more of German merchandise than has been sunk in the ships of our own.

Old Ferry Undergoing Repairs Here

The old Car Ferry "Prince Edward Island" is undergoing repairs at Bruce Stewart & Co's Wharf at present. The work is being done by the company's regular staff and a number of extra men.

The ferry is being completely renovated and will present a fine appearance when finished as well as being in much better working condition. The work is progressing favourably and workmen have the advantage of having the machine shop and boiler shop right along side them which helps speed up the repairs.

The boilers on the ferry are being overhauled and the steam tubes 650 in all are being replaced as are also the 650 air tubes. All main and auxiliary steam lines are being overhauled as well as all copper piping.

Hydraulic pressure is being used to test main steam pipes which were taken down and are now being replaced.

The interior of the ferry is being refinished with new tile floors placed in the men's toilet and wash rooms. The floors and walls of the main saloon have been refinished. The work is being completed by the latter part of October.

The staff of sixty patients occupy its beds all the time, but the average number of days necessary for them to stay is being lessened continually, and the constant advancement of medical science and hospital routine. Replace Lost Tonnage

Moreover, if we are losing tonnage we are also taking steps to replace it on a far larger scale. Old ships which were laid up are being refitted and repaired for sea.

An enormous building program of new ships of simple character, capable of being rapidly built, is already in full career. We therefore hope to have a much larger margin in the future to meet new forms of attack.

The house will observe that I have confined myself to U-Boat warfare but after all the U-Boat attack on British oceanwide commerce was one of the most heart-breaking hazards of the last war. It seemed in the early months of 1916 that it might compass our total ruin. Only those who were through it at the summit know what it was like.

Persevere To Conquer

We have no reason on the information and the experience now will recur. If this surmise is correct, what does it mean? It means that one primary danger is falling into its proper confines and that our steady measure of assurance that so far as the submarine is concerned, the British Empire and all its friends in every corner of the globe, will be able to develop their immeasurable strength, wealth, resources and manpower of those many communities can be concentrated in an ever growing intensity on the task which we have only to persevere to conquer.

south from East Prussia, through Warsaw, to the junction of the Hungarian and Slovak frontiers. It will be noted that this line brings the Soviet forces up to the suburbs of Warsaw and leaves the greater part of Galicia and the Polish oil wells in Soviet control.

In these circumstances the Polish armies, taken in the rear as well as in front, have naturally been unable to maintain their ground. The Poles, however, have not however given up the struggle and the whole world is deeply moved by the magnificent heroism by the defenders of Warsaw and the Hel Peninsula, still holding out against the mounting German forces in spite of ruthless and continuous bombardings.

On the western front the French have continued to make progress in certain localities and have succeeded notwithstanding increasingly energetic German reaction in maintaining all their gains intact.

Air Activities Normal

In the air activities work of the assistance and anti-submarine patrol in cooperation with the Royal Navy, has been continued.

Many attacks have been made on enemy submarines. Continuous air patrols make it far more dangerous for hostile submarines to come to the surface. The work of the coastal command patrols has thus proved of the utmost assistance to the Royal Naval in combating the submarine menace.

In the Dominion, the preparation of His Majesty's Governments continue with gathering momentum. Dominion naval vessels, sailing with the Dominion Army, are being trained for service as circumstances may demand.

Dominion air strength is being made ready for use overseas. Supplies of finished munitions, raw materials and foodstuffs from the Dominion are increasing volume for the common cause.

Vast Undertakings

It may be of interest to the House and to the country if I make my main theme today the development of some of the vast undertakings, vital to the winning of the war, now being entered upon on the home front.

Let me begin with a short account of the work of the Ministry of Economic Warfare. The general object of the Ministry is to disrupt the enemy's economic structure to such an extent as to make it impossible for her to carry on the war.

Germany already possesses stocks of raw materials which she cannot therefore be expected to import and quick re-exports from the Ministry of Economic Warfare. But our main aim is to cut off Germany from many of her sources of supply, and the figures show that we have three times as much of these goods as to which we were previously accustomed to supply. These include 22,000 tons of petroleum products, 65,000 tons of iron ore and 3,700 tons of manganese ore.

German Propaganda

German propaganda has meanwhile been active in alleging that our contraband control is a self-inflicted wound on our own hand, but will on the other hand, completely strangle neutral trade. I do not know which of these statements is further from the truth.

Comparisons

Facts speak for themselves and need no comparison. I am sure that our own comparison between our hand and the other is a thin veil. Germany towards neutrals, menaces which in the past few days have been translated into action by the circumstances constituting a clear breach of international law.

Industry Concentrated on War

In its effects upon the life of the nation the great change that is now taking place in the scope of our industry is all important. Practically the whole force of our industry has now to be concentrated directly or indirectly on war production.

Our industry is now being reorganized so that the country's resources require more than machinery for the regulation of working conditions and of employment and it is the view of the Government that the support of both employers and workers or organizations is essential if this country is to put forth its maximum effort.

Finally I wish to say a word to the House and to the country about our attitude towards the war. We have our people been more united than ever before. They are more determined. They are more resolved and the simple fact cannot be too often stressed to rid themselves once and for all of the old German aggression to which Poland is only the latest instance. We and France

Red Cross Work Committee Gets Under Way

The Red Cross Work Committee under the Chairmanship of Mrs. J. H. McQuaid, held its first meeting in the Canadian Legion Rooms on Monday, September 26th. Other members of the Committee were present as well as representatives of the ladies organizations of the different churches in Charlottetown.

The committee will commence at an early date to make up the work of the Red Cross. The committee will give out yarn and directions for knitting socks and the members' sleeveless sweaters to the different organizations on Friday, September 26th, from ten to twelve in the morning, and from two to five in the afternoon in the Canadian Legion Rooms.

MAN'S SLEEVELESS SWEATER

Following are the official directions for making men's sleeveless sweaters as issued by the Red Cross Society:

2 No. 7 Needles (if tight knitter use No. 6) 9 to 10 oz. 4 ply fingering wool. Double knit. 10 ridges. Back-Cast on 80 stitches. Knit 2 plain 2 purl for 4 inches. Knit plain until sweater measures 28 inches in all. Knit 26 stitches on neck knit to extra needle; bind off next 24 stitches for neck, and knit remaining 28 stitches for 10 ridges to form shoulder. Then make 1 and knit to end of row. Increase as above every second row, until there are 48 stitches. Break wool and join to other shoulder and knit the same way as the other side. Then knit 80 stitches plain until sweater measures 19 inches. Then 4 inches of ribbing; this finishes the front. Sew up sides leaving 8 inches for armholes. Finish arm-holes and neck with one row of loose single crochet.

New Monthly Record For Gold Production

OTTAWA, Sept. 25 (CP) - Establishing a new monthly record, gold production in Canada in July totalled 440,065 ounces, the highest since 1913, according to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported today. Its value was \$15,430,436. In August, production totalled 419,988 ounces valued at \$14,739,899.

Gold production by Provinces for July, 1939, in brackets: Ontario 280,920 ounces; Quebec 74,877 (71,391); British Columbia 56,975 (57,536); Manitoba and Saskatchewan 22,357 (20,960); Yukon and Northwest Territories 22,703 (8,102); and Nova Scotia 2,029 (2,010).

Sweeping Neutrality Plan Proposed

PANAMA, Panama, Sept. 26 - The United States today proposed to the inter-American neutrality conference a sweeping program designed to preserve the present neutrality of the American republics.

The program, which would be undertaken in cooperation with the other American republics, was presented by the chief United States delegate, Sumner Wells, under-secretary of state.

Six main points provided for: 1. A safety zone for merchant shipping in the patrolling of which the United States navy would cooperate and, in effect, bear the chief burden. An attempt to prevent searches, seizures, commerce raiding and other belligerent activities in this zone would be made.

2. A ban on belligerent submarines in the ports of American republics.

3. A joint representation to the belligerents setting forth the neutrality declarations of the Americas.

4. An "inter-American advisory committee" to study stabilization of monetary and commercial relationships among the American republics.

5. Preservation of liberal trade policies in the western hemisphere.

6. Suppression of "subversive activities" and activities violating neutrality.

Wells stated the United States navy would cooperate in patrolling waters adjacent to the coast of the western hemisphere.

The territorial waters of Canada, already at war, and of the colonies and possessions of European countries in the Americas would be respected.

In explanation, Wells said that the patrol would be undertaken only when deemed necessary after consultation.

Says Canada Ready To Fill Responsibilities

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26 (AP) -Loring C. Christie, new Canadian Minister to the United States, said today Canada is seeking to her own defence, although appreciating President Roosevelt's pledge of assistance in case of attack.

At a press conference after presenting his credentials to President Roosevelt, Mr. Christie, on being asked to comment on Mr. Roosevelt's statement in regard to Canada at a recent press conference, said:

"President Roosevelt's words were received in Canada in the same way as his speech at Kingston, Ont., last year. That is, it was received with friendliness, as the same time Canadians realize that we have our own responsibilities for the defence of Canada."
