PROBLEMS DISCUSSED AT TEACHERS CONVENTION

Addresses Delivered by Dr. McMillan, Rev. Dr. McLellan and Rev. W. Orr Mulligan Upon Vital Educational Problems.

Speaking before the P. E. Island Teachers' Union Thursday night at Prince Street School, Dr. W. J. P. McMillan, president of the Educational Association, stressed the great importance of medical inspection in the public schools and the responsibility resting upon the teachers of the province in promoting this necessary work.

Other provinces maintain both physicians and nurses to do this work alone, and they find that it pays. In the Province, with a declining population, every measure should be taken to safeguard the health of the rising generation. The speaker referred to the excellent work carried on by the nurses and doctors under the auspices of the Red Cross. The need of such work was evident from the reports already received. In 1921 twenty schools were medically examined and it was found that 93.8 per cent. of the pupils had defects of some kind. In 1922, 119 schools (3,515 pupils) were examined. 95.5 per cent. had defects, and 88.2 had defects other than from the teeth. 24.9 per cent. were under weight for their age, and only 4.5 were without defects.

In face of these alarming figures, the speaker urged the Government to make a special sum for the purpose of medical inspection in every school in the province. At the present time there is no such grant. There is need of economy in public administration, but in this respect it will not pay to be too economical. The speaker believed that when the people are prepared to make their demand clear, the Government will acquiesce. He cited from medical authorities, particularly from Sir William Osler, the most outstanding figure in British and Canadian medicine at the time of his death, on the percentage of malnutrition, tubercular, adenoids and tonsil cases among children. We know that in this province the death rate from tuberculosis is not decreasing as it should. 25 per cent. of the pupils examined in our schools showed signs of malnutrition; 25 to 35 per cent. have defective vision and the percentage having defective hearing, adenoids and tonsils is equally alarming.

Perhaps teachers do not stop to think of the effect of these defects have upon children, who, as a result may be backward, their work, dull, stupid and careless. Sir William Osler said that if he were asked whether alcohol or defective teeth caused the greater damage to health, he would hesitatingly say defective teeth. He said that in this province, and in other provinces as well, seventy-five per cent. of our public school children have been found to have defective teeth.

What is the use of spending large sums on education, continued Dr. McMillan, if the pupils are going to fall afterwards in life through defective health? He emphasized strongly the privilege and the responsibility of teachers in encouraging health measures until such time as regular medical inspection becomes general throughout the province. In rural schools funds are often scarce, but there is always the opportunity of raising money through school concerts.

These funds may go to purchase many improvements. There is, for instance, a great dearth of patriotic pictures in the schools throughout the Province. Often school conditions are far from ideal, but there is always the opportunity of bettering them to some extent. In the opinion of new schools the teacher's advice is generally sought and he or she should be ready with suggestions that would tend to the welfare of the pupils. The teacher should take an impartial interest in the pupils, not should visit irregularly from home to house. This is the only way to insure sympathetic cooperation.

other fellow. The aim should be higher and more ideal than this. Education is tending to become more democratic and among new features are continuation schools and people's universities. Books are cheap, and every home should be well supplied with the best of them, as well as with the best standard papers and magazines treating of current events.

The solving of the problem of education would enable us to read the future of the human race. Vast possibilities lie in its development. Education will enable our children to go forth and enter upon a glorious heritage. The very land in which we live is at the disposal of the best educated of its people. It would be distressing indeed to think that native born Canadians should come day, through lack of education, become the servants of the more enterprising strangers within our gates.

There is another grave problem facing this country, said Mr. Mulligan in conclusion, and it is this: Will the fundamental faith of Christianity be ruled out of the curriculum of our schools? This was a matter requiring earnest attention of all Christian people, and it was one which vitally affected the race.

The closing session of the P. E. Island Teachers' Union was held in an excellent school yesterday afternoon at the Charlottetown Hotel. After an excellent and instructive address by Miss Carrie Holman of the Conference held in Toronto, the resolution committee introduced the following: RESOLVED: Whereas it is desirable to enlist the co-operation of all teachers possible in the work of the Union, and whereas in addition to the annual meeting of the Union, at which all the teachers do not attend, and whereas educational meetings have been held in the past, it is therefore resolved that the Teachers' Union in an annual convention assembled do arrange with the Dept. of Education and inspectors if possible to have these meetings as branch meetings of the Teachers' Union; be it further resolved that the one dollar annual fee, when paid by any teacher either at the annual meeting or branch meeting shall entitle the teacher to all privileges of the Union.

RESOLVED: That the incoming executive be authorized to urge upon the Government the adoption of an adequate pension law for teachers of this province. Further resolved, that the scale of pensions be equal to one-sixteenth of the average salary during the last five years of teaching, multiplied by a number equal to the number of years of service and that a teacher may be eligible after fifteen years experience, and that the maximum pension be available after forty years service, that the minimum pension be three hundred dollars and the maximum eight hundred dollars.

AND WHEREAS: The teachers of the Provinces of British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Ontario and Quebec, have already become affiliated with this federation.

AND WHEREAS: It is desirable that the entire teaching profession of the Dominion be thus organized.
