The latest news, first of all.

The highest temperature recorded yesterday was thirty degrees above zero and the coldest was twenty-seven above up till nine p.m. The coldest recorded the previous night was twenty-six above.

J. A. McEachern, has completed a hot water pressure system in the residence of Hammond Kelly, Southport, and will install at once the same heating system in the Arena Rink and the residence of William McKinlay, North River.

Last night a meeting of the Executive of the I. O. O. F., was held at Kensington. S. F. Hodgson and G.W. McPhee, City, were among those in attendance. A public demonstration in connection with the meeting was also held in Malpeque at which Miss Lottie Nicholson's City, was greatly appreciated in several well rendered numbers.

The late W. McLea Walbank, of Montreal, bequeathed his estate to his widow (daughter of Capt Wm Richards, Bidford) for her use during her lifetime and at her death to be divided equally between his three sons, Willie, Kenneth and Jack. He also left \$1000 to the Montreal General Hospital, \$500 to the Protestant Hospital for the Insane, and \$500 annually to his sisters, to be paid during their lifetime only.—Exc.

John Moreside, North River, received a telegram yesterday morning conveying the sad news of the sudden death of his sister, Jennima Moreside, who has been residing in Boston for the past fifteen years. The deceased was in her 64th year and the cause of her death is yet unknown. The remains will arrive in a few days and the funeral notice will appear later. Daniel Moreside, North River, is another brother who is left to mourn the loss of a kind and loving sister.

The closing exercises of the Union Commercial College took place Tuesday evening in the College Hall. A short program was furnished by the students, consisting of choruses, vocal solos, piano solos, and readings. The Highland Fling dance was gracefully performed by the Misses Byrne and McDonald, accompanied by little Miss Nellie Dougan, and was heartily enjoyed. Diplomas and prizes were then distributed, amid great applause. Prin. Moran and Vice-Prin Duffus were then presented with addresses and valuable gifts by the students, which were suitably replied to by the recipients. Prin Moran in the course of his remarks reviewed the work of the past term—the best ever accomplished at the U. C. C. Miss Hazel Stewart, assistant in the Shorthand Department, was presented by Prin. Moran, with a handsome gold watch. The evening closed with refreshments and games, which were heartily enjoyed by all.

The executive of the Central Anti-Tuberculosis Society at a recent meeting passed a resolution authorizing the Central Society to hand over the Free Dispensary and assets in the hands of the committee to the Charlottetown Subsidiary Society, on condition that the central organization be allowed the privilege of using it as a central bureau of information and for the distribution of literature to the various subsidiary branches on the Island. President Dr McLaughlan, Dr Johnson, W. E. Bentley and Principal J. D. Seaman were appointed a committee to select and order an additional supply of literature. The President and the Secretary were appointed a committee to wait upon the Provincial Government with a view of securing the balance of the grant for the Anti-Tuberculosis movement. Arrangements in connection with the annual meeting on January 12th, 1910, were discussed. It was decided to hold the business meeting at 11 a.m. and a public meeting in some large hall in the evening. At the latter an attractive programme will be presented, including addresses on various branches of the work by prominent physicians and musical selections. A committee of five were appointed to conclude arrangements.
