That Body of Hours

CLASS METHOD OF TREATING HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE

Some weeks ago I spoke of the work of Dr. Edward Weiss, Philadelphia, in obtaining excellent results in the treatment of high blood pressure by quieting the fears of the patients. Further results of the use of this "quieting" method in reducing high blood pressure and encouraging the patient are reported by Dr. Robert W. Buck in Annals of Internal Medicine. Instead of treating these hypertensive (high blood pressure) patients singly, Dr. Buck conducts a Hypertension Class, using the "quieting" method to remove tension and secure relaxation in these patients.

"His results over a period of several months have justified expectations. Patients report relief from such symptoms as dizziness, pain in the neck, hot burning sensations in the head, sleeplessness, and shortness of breath. The fact that they all report that they 'feel fine' (where formerly they had all kinds of symptoms) shows the improvement in the mental condition even when the blood pressure had not been really reduced. However two-thirds of those who have made three or more visits to the class report a fall in the blood pressure of from 18 to 46 points (millimetres of mercury)."

Dr. Buck's aim is not just to lower the blood pressure; it is to aid these patients to feel better, lose their fears, and adapt themselves better to life.

"When a patient joins a group, his individuality merges into the group, and his individual resistance to suggestion is overcome by the contagion of the group response to its leader. As all the patients are working toward overcoming the fear of high blood pressure each one helps the group, and the group helps each one. The class instruction develops a spirit of cooperation and enthusiasm."

The class treatment is from three standpoints—a triangle is used to illustrate it. These are (a) medical and surgical care which includes treatment of varicose veins, diabetes, sinus trouble, congestive heart failure; (b) diet, which is strict at first—potatoes, baked and eaten with the skins, dark bread and butter, milk and apples or other fresh fruit; and (c) suggestion, in which the whole cause or reason for high blood pressure is thoroughly explained and why physical and nervous strain increases the blood pressure and also increases the symptoms. Relaxation is the keynote at each class meeting during which a five-minute period of complete silence and repose occurs.

Centennial Of Wheatley River United Church

The one hundredth anniversary of the opening of the first church at Wheatley River, P. E. I., was fittingly celebrated on Sunday, Aug. 28th, 1938. Large congregations filled the United Church in the morning and afternoon, while in the evening the Church was filled to capacity for an hour before the service was announced to begin, and many unable to gain admission gathered in the vestibule and before the open windows, to listen to the service. The pastor, Rev. W. A. MacQuarrie, was assisted in the morning by Rev. S. H. Boyce, immediate past Chairman of the Prince Edward Island Presbytery, who brought his greetings and congratulations of the Presbytery, and preached a helpful and inspiring sermon on the "Madness of Christianity," from Acts 26-24.

The afternoon service was given over to former pastors. Rev. J. B. Cough, of Richibucto, N. B., who had been pastor from 1910-1914, was heartily welcomed, and after assisting in the service, gave a message of greeting and encouragement. Rev. Henry Pierce, of Charlottetown, who had been minister at Wheatley River and associated churches from 1896 to 1899 and again from 1906 to 1910, preached an interesting and instructive sermon. Messages and greetings were read from a number of other former pastors, as follows: Revs. A. F. MacLeod, St. John; G. A. Sellar, Fredericton, N. B.; L. J. Leard, Halifax; R. M. Baxter, St. John; N. B.; A. E. Chapman, Pettaquamscutt, N. B.; and F. E. Boothroyd, Shediac, N. B. Rev. Geo. Ayers, 1892-1893, being unable to be present, all these messages were heard with deep interest and appreciation by the large congregation present.

In the evening the service was led by the present pastor and he was assisted by Mr. Gough, and Rev. Bruce E. Carey, of New Carlisle, P. Q., who preached the sermon. Mr. Carey was a native of the community and a former member of the Wheatley River congregation, and he was heard with interest and regard by his former neighbors and friends. At the service Mr. MacQuarrie read a historical sketch of the Church from its foundation a hundred years ago until the present time. Rev. W. G. Quigley of the New Glasgow Christian Church, who had cancelled his evening service in order to be present, brought a memorable and inspiring day to a close with the Benediction.

The services of praise throughout the day were of a high order. A number of former members of the church were present in the morning and afternoon, including Miss Mae Smith of Charlottetown, a former organist who presided at the organ. In the evening the Choir of the North Wilshire United Church, under the leadership of Mrs. Bruce Noye, led the praise. Solos were rendered at the different services by Gordon Carey, Hunter River; Willard Selinger, Hunter River; and Mrs. Eida Clow, of North Wilshire.
