YESTERDAY was nomination for the Cardigan district and Patrick Kelly, Conservative, Montague and Donald Sigsworth, Liberal, Cardigan were nominated.

A SPECIAL meeting of the City Council will be held on Thursday night to consider the by-law relating to electric wire inspection and also to appoint an inspector.

THE hockey match in the Rink last night resulted in a victory for Artillery over Allicomers by a score of 6 to 3. Quite a number enjoyed a skate after the match.

THE sealing steamer Elliott, ashore at St. Paul's Island is a total wreck, her back being broken. The Government steamer Lady Laurier left Louisburg yesterday morning to bring off her crew of 115.

THE I. C. R. is to place a new engine house in Sussex. Walter Roche, of P. E. I. was there in connection with buying material for such work. He is agent for Contractor W. Kitchen, who has the contract.—Moncton Transcript.

Alf. Trainor of the firm of James & Trainor left by the afternoon train yesterday for a two weeks holiday at Rollo Bay. Mr. Trainor attempted a similar visit last week but had to return from Mount Stewart owing to the trains being blocked.

THE Ottawa Club Stanley Cup holders, played thirteen games this season and won eleven of them. One was a tie, five all, with the Wanderers, and the other was a 6 to 2 defeat at the hand of the Winnipeg Rowing Club. The champions scored 100 goals as against 30 for their opponents.

REV. G. P. Raymond will preach his last sermons in connection with the secretaryship of the P. E. I. Sunday School Association next Sunday as follows:—Morning at the Methodist church, North Wiltshire; at 2.30 at Kingston Methodist church; and at 7.30 at New Dominion Baptist church.

H. L. CHIPMAN, Halifax, manager of the Plant Line has wired the Board of Trade with reference to the berthing of their boats at the wharf recently purchased by the Federal Government as follows:

"Do not bother further about the wharf as we have received positive assurance from the Minister that we can use the same."

At a meeting of the Baptist Church held last evening the matter of building a suitable parsonage was discussed, and the following resolution was passed:—"Resolved that Pastor White be authorized to solicit subscriptions for said purpose, and if any amount sufficient could be secured that the church would at once take action and proceed with building."

A HALIFAX despatch of the 19th says:—The steamer Elliott is now in Atlantic Cove, St. Paul's Island, leaking badly. Pump cannot keep her free. The captain put the sealing crew ashore. He is afraid she will not keep afloat till he gets to Channel, Nfld., and is thinking of abandoning her. She has one hundred and fifteen men.

The County Court of Queen's County opened in Charlottetown yesterday at 11 o'clock with 126 new suits on the docket. At the opening of the court applications were made for the naturalization of Cecesin J. Dowd and Anthony Skaff and for the re-admission into British nationality of Thomas Taylor and Frank Howard Hale. The court will be in session for several days.

AN Ottawa despatch says:—H. A. McKeown, ex-solicitor-general of New Brunswick; C. J. Milligan, ex-manager of the St. John Telegraph, and Gilmour Brown, C. E., are here. The trio first named are interviewing the minister of railways with respect to starting a straight Liberal morning paper in St. John. David Russell is expected here on Monday and things now look as if the Telegraph would change hands. Mr. Brown is here, it is said, in connection with railway matters in New Brunswick relating especially to extensions with the projected Grand Trunk Pacific route.

The Clydesdale Stallion Crown Jewel owned by the Provincial Government was offered for sale at Georgetown yesterday afternoon. The highest bid was \$270 but he was reserved at \$150. Crown Jewel is a beautiful dark brown with white face and feet, weighs about 1600 pounds, although he is under three years old, and is in all points a worthy son of his celebrated father Crown Rights bred in the stables of her late Majesty Queen Victoria. He won 2nd prize as a foal at Halifax in 1901, competing in a very strong class including a colt out of a celebrated Scotch Mare. He also won 1st prize for two years in succession at the Inter-provincial Exhibition in Charlottetown.
