

FIRST OPEN FRANCHISE ELECTION IN ONTARIO

(Special to The Guardian) TORONTO, August 19.—Ontario's first election with a wide open franchise will be held today when the electors of Northeast Toronto and East York, more than doubled in numbers since the last provincial general election, by the extension of the franchise to women, will express their preferences. In Northeast Toronto the voters have to choose between Hon. Dr. Coby, the newly appointed minister of education, and William Varley, running as a soldier labor candidate of agriculture, and John Galbraith, a gentleman of indefinite affiliations, who is running as an independent.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, carby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. CORY, C. M. Deputy Minister of the Interior and publication of this notice.
