ISLAND DOCTOR REACHES ROFFEY CAMP

The following letter has been received by Mrs. M. Nicholson of Edmonton, Alta., sister of Dr. J. R. Matheson formerly of Cardigan, P. E. Island:

Canadian Siege Artillery, Roffey Camp, Horsaam, Sussex, Eng., Feb. 20, 1916

Dear Sister:—I have just recovered from a lovely dose of real influenza and have been confined to my room for ten days. A good many of the Officers had been similarly affected, before my coming here, from Shorncliffe as Medical Officer of this Brigade.

I arrived in England (Liverpool) on the 9th December. Sailing by the Baltic (White Star) on Dec. 1st from New York.

I went straight to London, applied at the Headquarters of the Canadian Contingent, and after visiting Bearley and Barbara, staying there for about three weeks, received orders to report in London where I received my Captains Commission on Jan. 8th.

So that's about all. I have been attending to my duties ever since, first at Shorncliffe, South of England near Dover, later here. I am what is known as Medical Officer (Med) for the Canadian Siege Brigade which at present consists of the 97 and the 98th Batteries, and may be increased by another Battery.

Just when we go to the front, and where we go I do not know, but you may be sure I want to do all in my power to fight to a finish, those nations that would crush with an iron heel everything we regard, and the closer the range the better.

I am closing for now. A letter addressed to me here, will reach me wherever I am.

My love and best wishes to you all.

The last artistic touch being given, and every hair and curl in its proper place and poise, they hastily returned to the old historic Hall.

"They flew to the Chamber, 'twas lonely,

Three Trains Crash Thirty Dead

CLEVELAND, Ohio, March 29.—With a toll of at least thirty persons dead and forty or more injured, federal and state officials, and officials of the railroad company began to-day an investigation into the cause that led early this morning to one of the most disastrous wrecks that has occurred in this state in a dozen years, and one of the worst in the history of the New York Central system.

Three trains, including the Twentieth Century Limited, west-bound, the New York Central's palatial flyer, and two sections of number 86, known as the Chicago-Pittsburgh Limited, east-bound, came together in collision near of Cleveland.
