RETURN FROM FOX SHOW—The Island exhibitors returned home last Saturday night from the Royal Fox Show at Toronto coming by special car attached to the Maritime Express from Montreal. The party arriving at Summerside spoke very highly of their successful trip and were naturally elated at the results obtained by the Island foxes, especially from Summerside and vicinity, which carried off nearly all the prizes. LAYING TOWN WATER TO C. N. E. TANK—Negotiations have been under way for the past couple of weeks between the C.N.R. authorities and the Summerside Water and Sewerage Commissioners with a view to a supply of town water for the big tank placed in the new tower built at the foot of the Railway Wharf, near the freight shed, instead of the supply being obtained from a well and force pump, as at first intended by the railway authorities. The latter proposition has now been abandoned and the Commission Grady that their terms for the supply have been agreed to. This was confirmed and the necessary resolution passed at a meeting of the Water and Sewerage Commissioners held last night. In the meantime Mr. Albert Groom, Water and Sewerage Engineer, has started work with a force of four men digging a trench from the C.N.R. water tower to a hydrant near the foot of Read's Wharf, in which a two-inch service pipe will be laid. The tank will supply water for the locomotives and other railway purposes. The work will take about a week or ten days to complete. S

POTATO SHIPMENTS—Seventy-five thousand bushels of potatoes are now being loaded by the steamer Stahl at Georgetown. The weather during Friday and Saturday prevented the completing of the cargo but it is thought that the steamer will be fully loaded and ready to sail on Tuesday. This shipment by the P. E. I. Potato Growers' Association is partly for New York. Another steamer is expected to arrive here about the tenth of December and it is planned to continue shipping most of the present month if the weather permits.

The chief mourner was the only son, Mr. Albert Baker of Summerside. The deceased's only daughter, Mrs. Martin W. Taylor of Summerside, died about twenty-five years ago. The late Mr. Baker was an architect of wide repute and many of the island's most handsome churches were planned by him and built under his supervision. In his private life he was as conscientious as in his work. His word was his bond and he could not tolerate any man whose word was not or whose actions were not above board. He was an ideal citizen whose memory amongst his many old friends will not fade.
