A RELIC OF DARK AGES. OTTAWA, April 18—That the present treatment of the inebriate in Canada is a relic of the dark ages is the declaration of Mr. W. P. Archibald, parole officer, who has returned to Ottawa after visiting the penitentiaries of Quebec and Ontario.

HOLY ROLLERS ARE INDICTED FOR CONSPIRACY. HILLSVILLE, Va., April 18—The Grand Jury of Carroll County today indicted twenty-one members of the "Holy Rollers" religious sect for conspiracy of causing the death of David King, a farmer, because he objected to his wife attending their meetings.

In retaliation they offered public prayers on several occasions for his "removal." On one occasion when he forced his wife to accompany him home it is alleged that the Rev. Mr. Frazier, who was conducting the service, informed King that he would be "done away with" if he persisted in preventing his wife from attending the revival.

Shortly after this King was found dead and the mysterious circumstances surrounding his death were never unravelled.

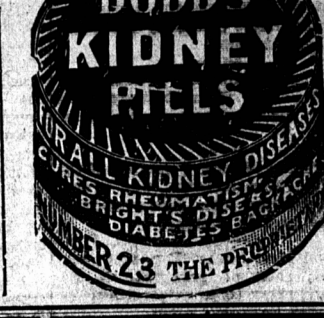

BIG IMMIGRATION SCHEME ADVOCATED. ST. JOHN, April 18.—Thomas Howell, the Canadian Northern Railway Co.'s commissioner for immigration and colonization, passed through the city yesterday afternoon on his way to Montreal.

When seen by a Standard reporter at the station, Mr. Howell said he had just returned from Halifax where he had been working in connection with the Nova Scotia immigration scheme. While there he had several conferences with Premier Murray and felt sure that much good would result.

"In my opinion," said Mr. Howell, "a giant immigration scheme embracing all the Canadian and British centres should be arranged along the lines of the recently formed British Canadian Corporation, Ltd., which plans to send thousands of farmers and other immigrants to this country. If this were done the results would undoubtedly be beneficial to Canada."
