

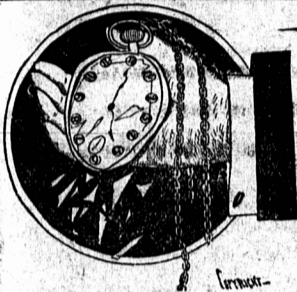

## IN MEMORIAM

ENTERED INTO REST  
(From yesterday's Evening Guardian)

At Winnipeg on 27th, Oct. 1913, Donald McDonald in his 79 year. His remains were laid to rest beside his daughter, Mrs. McDonald in Brookside Cemetery, Man. He leaves to mourn a widow and nine sons all in the West. His eldest son William, with whom his parents have resided for several years is one of the successful Islanders in Winnipeg. His many friends at North River where he resided for 40 years will remember him for his kindly and cheerful disposition. He was a son of the late Donald McDonald, who emigrated from Glasgow, Scotland, about 1800 and settled on the same farm but lived to see the wilderness made to blossom as the rose. The old home will long be remembered for its hospitality and Christian example. Three sisters survive of a family of eight: Mrs. John Dixon, of Highfield, Mrs. A. Cook of Nine Mile Creek and Mrs. D. Bears, Charlottetown. He died trusting in the merits of Christ's righteousness for an abundant entrance into his kingdom to swell the chorus of the redeemed who have gone before. A Winnipeg paper referring to his death says:—"The funeral of Donald McDonald, who died on Monday afternoon at Portage la Prairie, will take place this afternoon at 2 o'clock from Clark, Leathdale's chapel at Brookside Cemetery. The late Mr. McDonald was born in North River, P.E.I. He was a strong Conservative, and for the past twenty years he had been a Winnipeg citizen. The deceased had lived for ten years with his son, William Macdonald, 220 Ruby street, Winnipeg."—(Island papers please copy.)

# NEWS FROM THE SPORT CENTRES

## FOOTBALL

### S. D. C. AGAIN VICTORIOUS.

Devotees of "trugger" turned out in full force yesterday afternoon to witness a game that was played on the A. A. A. grounds between the St. Dunstan's College team and a visiting fifteen from St. Francis Xavier's, Antigonish.

The ground was not in good order, being soft and slippery, and the players found it difficult to retain their footing, especially the visitors. But the standard of the play was a good deal better than the match played last Thursday; the teams were fairly evenly matched and an interesting game resulted.

St. Dunstan's started with the wind in their favour and with this advantage had the better of their opponents in the first five or ten minutes of play, though achieving no success in the way of scoring. While they twice forced St. F. Xavier's to make safety touches, they themselves were once compelled to do the same. Eventually, St. Dunstan's, with the play in their opponents' quarters, made a determined effort to score and from a line-out near St. F. X's goal Butler and Fitzgerald initiated a good movement but Sark, when in a good position for a clear run through, passed and the movement was checked by the opposing halves. The visitors retaliated with some forcing play and by good passing work among the halves, their ring wing carried the ball well up into the St. Dunstan's half of the field and when pressed, made a good attempt to find touch with a long punt; but Kelly, the clever S. D. C. half, captured the ball and with a return punt sent it flying back into the visitors' quarters. Then ensued a series of scrums, in which play ceased from side to side of the field without materially advancing towards either goal. Some more good work by the visitors' right wing half resulted in the S. D. C. full back being called upon to save a ticklish situation, which he did in a useful cool play, nicely taking a long punt and sending the ball back to the other side. The end of the first half arrived without either team having scored. On the play in this half, it was evident that the visitors' halves were quicker and cleaner in passing and better combined than the S. D. C. line; on the other hand, St. Dunstan's were faster and surer on the ball, and worked the crums better.

### THE SECOND HALF.

In this half the visitors had the wind in their favour and they began by taking play into St. Dunstan's quarters. Good dribbling on the part of their forwards saw the S. D. C. full-back pressed, but when he had a full chance of clearing two of his own halves hampered him and the opposing forwards being quick on the ball, a scrum was formed within the S. D. C. 25-yard line. St. Dunstan's, however, rallied and worked the scrum exceedingly well taking the play out of such dangerous zone. For a foul, however, a free kick was awarded against them and the visitors tried for goal but the heavy wind that was blowing foiled the attempt, the ball going wide and not getting anywhere near goal. The visitors continued to press and in checking a hot run by their right wing forwards, Jacob Sark, one of the S. D. C. halves, met with an accident. Two of the opposing players pulled him down and fell over him and he sustained a fracture of the right elbow, causing play to be suspended for several minutes. Sark, though pluckily willing to continue playing, had to be retired; his place being taken by Reid. In consequence, a change was made in the disposition of the S. D. C. team. Reid going up into the forward pack and Murphy and McPhee dropping to halves. St. D. C. now playing five halves. In some desultory play Morrissey, the visitors' full back, showed himself an extremely clever player, getting the ball from a long punt he made a fine run, by which he carried play well over the border and when pressed sent the ball flying towards S. D. C. goal, his forwards taking it up and dribbling it hard down. The when they were looking dangerous Murphy came to the rescue of S. D. C. by clearing into touch. From the throw-out St. Dunstan's made a good run and though Morrissey made an error and let the ball pass, one of his halves, who was supporting him nicely, came to the rescue and sent the ball into touch. The visitors' right halves put in a clever run in which they combined very well, but were not supported as they should have been and so when they got into collision with the opposing halves were soon tackled and their run checked. St. Dunstan's retaliatory measures did not take them up very far before a scrimmage resulted, and getting the ball the visitors' halves put in some more clever combined work all along the line in a pretty movement, but the sure tackling of the S. D. C. brought them up before they got dangerous. St. Dunstan's attacked and Kelly made a good run, and when pressed found touch in a nice punt. But the visitors offered a determined defence to the S. D. C. attack and for some time play was a give and take character. However, from a scrum formed in the visitors' quarters, the St. Dunstan's halves put in a great run. The ball was nicely healed out and Kelly picked it up in the loose, dodged and ran, and when tackled passed to Murphy, who repeated these tactics and then passed to Fitzgerald, whose run and dodges were splendid, and when he was tackled he sent the oval out to McLeasac who pelted it hard down the wing, carrying the ball within

striking distance of the visitors' touch-line before he was brought down. From the resulting scrum the same player made another good attempt to get through, but was nicely tackled. However, St. Dunstan's were not to be denied, and picking the ball up in the loose following this scrum, Murphy with nice judgment, when in front of goal about twenty yards away, tried a dropkick, and to the delight of his team-mates and the even greater delight of the S. D. C. rosters, scored a fine drop goal. Play ended almost immediately afterwards, and St. Dunstan's thus won by four points to nil. It was a victory that they deserved.
