PRUNING OF APPLE TREES

(Experimental Farms Note) Pruning fruit trees is an operation which may be performed successfully during the dormant season, and the month of March or early April in most districts offers an excellent opportunity to get the job done. If it is a young tree which is to be pruned, bear in mind that your pruning should consist of training the young tree to a good shape and that to do this may require rather severe pruning.

In handling bearing trees, the general practice is to perform what may be termed only regulatory pruning; that is, to prune just enough to prevent the head from becoming too thick. Continual cutting back delays the time of bearing and, if

Royal Cousins To Be Married

Princess Caroline—Mathilde and Prince Knud of Denmark, are Betrothed

Beautiful, twenty year old Princess Caroline—Mathilde, daughter of Prince and Princess Harald and niece of King Christian of Denmark, is already busy with plans for her marriage to her sailor cousin, Prince Knud.

The wedding will probably take place in Copenhagen in the autumn for the Royal cousins are immensely popular. Prince Knud is very tall, like his father the King, handsome and athletic. Princess Caroline—Mathilde is slender and fair-haired with big expressive eyes.

Their romance really began in the nursery of Princess Caroline—Mathilde. For ever since she was a very small—and very jolly—child she has adored her big, laughing cousin. And he has never failed to visit "pretty little Caroline" when on leave.

Neither of them would talk about their romance when interviewed. The great warmth with which the announcement of their betrothal was received by the Danish people and the deluge of congratulations from all over the world have made them rather shy!

But Princess Harald, the mother of Princess Caroline—Mathilde, talked. "My daughter is very happy indeed," she said, "and we all are happy too, because she and Prince Knud have always been the best of friends, and he is an extremely charming young man. We have known him well all his life, and he has known my daughter almost all her life.

"She is a sports girl and is persevered in too long, may materially reduce yields. Some of the Tariff Changes

The tariff changes which follow were announced in the Budget Speech by Hon. E. N. Rhodes, and take effect immediately unless otherwise stated. Each item starts with the number it will have in the Canadian tariff, followed by the commodities affected, then the new tariff rates in order, British preference, intermediate which applies to all foreign countries with which Canada has trade agreements, general, which tariff applies to all countries with which Canada has no agreements, including the United States.

The corresponding rates at present in effect are contained within brackets.

It will be noted that in some items the new tariff is the same as the present. In these cases the change is in the wording of the tariff.

79—Florist stock, viz: Azaleas, Rhododendrons, pot-grown Lilacs, Rose stock and other stock for grafting, seedling Carnation stock, Araceae, bulbs, corms, tubers, rhizomes and dormant roots. N. O. P.: Free, 15 p. c.; 20 p. c.—Free, 15 p. c.—20 p. c.

79 C—Seedling stock for grafting viz: Plum, pear, peach and other fruit trees, free, free, free, (free 15 p. c.—20 p. c.)
