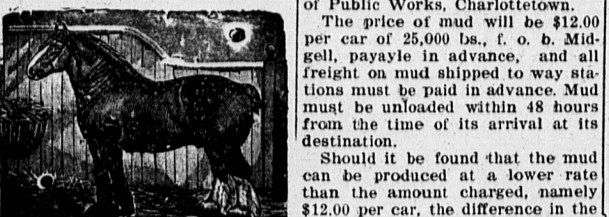

Premier Massey On Canadian Tader. NEW ZEALAND HAS 300,000 LBS. BUTTER WITHOUT A MARKET. VICTORIA, B. C., May 7.—The British dominions, bordering on the Pacific, must make it their duty to strengthen naval defence, said Premier Massey, of New Zealand, on his arrival here yesterday on his way to attend the Imperial Conference in London. In his comment on the Anglo-Japanese agreement, he said there could be no objection to its renewal so long as the dominions are given the right to choose their citizens. In Premier Massey's opinion a constitution for the British commonwealth of nations, and an imperial executive are vital needs of the Empire if the present solidarity among the dominions in relation to the Motherland is to be maintained. In another statement he said that any attempt to relieve New Zealand of her mandates over the Pacific islands or to change the policy relative to Samoa and other insular groups under the dominion's charge would be intolerable. New Zealand's premier said he would enter the Imperial Conference with an open mind so far as possible on the broader question to be discussed. In reference to the Anglo-Japanese treaty and the possibility of it being renewed, he said: "Japan was loyal to the Empire during the war and we owe her a debt of gratitude. It does not seem to be generally known that Japan, under the treaty, was not compelled to join Britain in the war." Mr. Massey expressed surprise that trade between Canada and New Zealand was not changed. In a single warehouse in Auckland he pointed out, there is stored away at present 300,000 pounds of New Zealand creamery butter with out a market in sight. He believed it could be sold at a cheaper price in Canada than any butter this country might secure from other points. The dairy products of New Zealand were being shipped at greatly increased rates and he believed this country would benefit if the matter was taken up in a practical, earnest way by business men of both dominions. Premier Massey said he was prepared today, and always had been prepared to place on the statutes of New Zealand a reciprocity law applying to Canada. There is already a certain amount of tariff preference given to Canadian goods and there is a general reciprocal preference recognized in New Zealand, but he did not believe this went far enough. He expressed the view that British Columbia was the logical market in the northern hemisphere for the product of New Zealand, and in exchange for what this country had to give it wanted timber, fish, fruit and manufactured articles. PLANT MORE POTATOES. ST. JOHN, N. B., May 7.—From Carleton county comes the report that the farmers of New Brunswick's garden spot, are not at all discouraged over the losses incurred from the 1920 potato crop, and will plant a larger acreage to potatoes this season than ever before. Seed was never so low in price, the farmers are mixing their own fertilizers, and, with the prospects of cheap farm labor, the growers of potatoes think there is a chance to recover last year's losses from this year's plant. The acreage planned by the Carleton farmers will be in excess of last year's, and an average yield with a fair market is hoped for.

SIR JOHN SIMON COMING. WINNIPEG, May 7.—Right-Hon. Sir John Simon, K. C., former Home Secretary and former Attorney-General of England, who is probably the most eminent practising member of the English Bar, has accepted an invitation to attend the annual meeting of the Canadian Bar Association at Ottawa on September 8th and 9th. Sir James Aikens, president of the Canadian Bar Association, made the above announcement today.

Northcliffe Expresses An Opinion. LONDON, May 7.—The function of Canadians in Anglo-Saxon relations has been described as the interpreting of Britain to the United States. To judge from a pointed reference to Sir Edward Mackay Edgar's pronouncements on the Anglo-American oil question, which was made by Lord Northcliffe in his address to the party of United States and Canadian dry goods delegates last night, one Canadian at least is not functioning properly. "Practically the whole of the American hostility to Great Britain's alleged attitude in regard to oil is based upon the statement of a second rate financier, not of English birth—a statement that attracted no attention at all in Great Britain," said Lord Northcliffe. "The identity of the 'second-rate financier' of Lord Northcliffe's reference is disclosed by a despatch printed in the Times on Monday, which stated: 'It is just a year ago that extracts quoted from the Times were read in the Senate, in which Sir Mackay Edgar declared that within a few years the United States will be paying British oil interests one billion dollars annually for oil for the American navy and American home consumption, and further that all known oil fields and all likely or probable oil fields outside the United States are in British hands, under British management or control, or financed by British capital.'
