Brief Biography Of Lorne Valley's Veteran Citizens

THE STORY OF MARY MUNROE

At the advanced age of one hundred years and five months Mary Munroe, now Mrs. Mary McSwain of Lorne Valley, Prince Edward Island, is still hale and hearty. Her hearing is not too good, but she can see almost as well as when she was a young woman.

"Aunt Mary," as she is familiarly called, was born on the Isle of Lewis, Scotland, in the year 1834.

Immigrating to Canada at the age of eight years she settled with her parents at Belfast, Prince Edward Island. The year of 1855 saw her married to Capt. Allan McSwain, who was also a native of Scotland. This union proved to be of short duration, for the Captain died when only thirty-one years of age. They had only one child, which died in infancy.

During their wedded life Mrs. McSwain frequently took long voyages with her husband to foreign lands, and the memories of those days she can recall with striking clearness.

Her keen mind follows events of today and she takes a deep interest in the community in which she lives.

When questioned as to what she considers the most essential thing in life, her prompt reply was "religion, without the love of God life would be futile indeed. Reading my Bible has comforted me throughout my long life and his blessed promise of a future existence is well worth contending for."

The wonderful old lady loves company, has a fine sense of humor and can still appreciate a good story.

THE STORY OF ANDREW FINLAYSON AND HIS WIFE EUPHEMIA MCLEOD

Mr. Finlayson, a retired farmer now living at Lorne Valley, was born on the Pisiquid Road eighty-six years ago.

Early in life he married Euphemia McLeod of Lorne Valley, Prince Edward Island. Their only child, a boy, died about seven years ago.

Though their advanced ages this couple are still going strong, especially Mr. Finlayson, who attends to all his home duties unaided.

They attribute their excellent health to the simple lives they led. Mr. Finlayson has used tobacco since he was a mere child and would rather miss a meal than be deprived of the weed.

THE STORY OF ISABEL MC-SWAIN

Isabel McSwain was born at Montague, Prince Edward Island, in the year 1844. At the age of three she removed with her parents to Lorne Valley, where she has resided ever since. Not many persons can boast of living in the same settlement for a period of eighty-four years.

Mrs. MacDonald is a real pioneer of this Valley, having experienced all the hardships the early families who settled the district in 1840.

To this couple were born nine children, five of whom still survive. They are: Alexander H. MacDonald, with whom this aged lady resides at Lorne Valley, where she has a native of the Isle of Skye, Scotland, who died February 8, 1917, at the ripe old age of eighty-four years.

Mrs. MacDonald retains all her faculties, can read without glasses and takes more than a passing interest in the twentieth century progress, but owing to injuries sustained several years ago she is unable to do much of her own work.

She too enjoys company, likes to chat about old times, and if you have the Gaelic you are sure to receive a real Highland welcome.

THE STORY OF CHRISTIE MACKINNON

This fine old lady was born in the Highlands of Scotland in the year 1844. At the age of fourteen years she immigrated to Caledonia, Prince Edward Island. At the age of twenty-two years she married Alexander MacDonald, a farmer of Bellevue. They had one child, Lillian, now Mrs. Frank Hatton, of Providence, R. I.

Mrs. MacDonald was a resident of Charlottetown for twenty-five years. Her husband died over thirty-five years ago.

PARIS FEARS AIR RAIDS

Following the official report that Paris was "hit" during the air raid during the recent mimic war in which the French Air Force was engaged, many Parisians fear a genuine surprise attack. The score of the "air raid" included thousands of casualties. Of 176 attacking war planes 140 reached their destination, and only one machine was "shot down." Seventy tons of bombs were dropped. Three hundred planes were included in the defense force.

STATUE SAVED FROM SEA

Standing erect at the bottom of the sea near the Island of Woomera, a bronze statue of Peter the Great has just been recovered. Before the World War it roamed Riga, Latvia, and on the advance of German soldiers in 1915 it was placed on a vessel bound for the Russian capital. The vessel was wrecked and the statue was missing until Estonians discovered it recently and returned it to Riga.

DIESEL TRAINS FOR CEYLON

Diesel express trains are to be put into service in Ceylon by the Government Railways before the first of next year. Two locomotives have been ordered and they will be used for hauling the Indian mail train between Colombo and Halaimannar, and each will cover 100,000 miles a year. They will be capable of doing efficiently any railway work, hauling any type of train, from passenger expresses to heavy freights.

Cameramen who made the film of Hitler's triumphant entry into Nuremberg, Germany, used roller skates to enable them to work fast. For half an hour all the churches in the town pealed a welcome to the Nazi chief, who was closely guarded by a cordon of "S.S." men and brown shirts. The film was directed by Leni Riefenstahl, the actress-producer of "Blue Light" and other films.

RELIC OF HUMAN LIFE IN BRITAIN IN THE BRONZE AGE FOUND

Relics of human life in Britain 2,000 years before Christ have been found in excavations in the ancient burial mound called Giant's Hill near Stendley, Lincolnshire, England.

Traces of temporary settlement by people of the Early Bronze Age, 1,000-1,500 B. C., and the Early Iron Age, 500-100 B. C., were discovered.

A considerable quantity of good "beaker" were found in an Early Bronze Age hearth, and a notable find in the late Bronze site was a curious clay figure which seems to represent a frog or toad.

This is almost unparalleled in discovery of this period in England.

The remains of seven persons, one of whom was a child, have been found in the middle of the mound. Much Neolithic pottery has been unearthed, but mostly in fragments. By a piece of good fortune, however the greater part of a fine bowl was found intact, including 3000 women.

The human remains were sent to the Royal College of Surgeons.
