Club Discusses Christmas Relief

At the Rotary luncheon Monday afternoon there was an interesting discussion in connection with the recommendation of the directors decided upon at a meeting last week to vote \$300 to the Red Cross Society for crippled children's work and \$50 to the Charlottetown Free Dispensary for relief for the poor at Christmas time. The net amount realized as the result of the Thanksgiving Day horse races was \$325 and this entire amount was donated plus \$25 from the Club as a whole. The directors decided that they would not personally canvass the individual members for contributions towards the Dispensary but that voluntary contributions may be sent to the Treasurer, Roy MacLure, on or before the 15th.

On motion the recommendation of the directors was approved of by the club. Dr. Johnson, President of the Red Cross, thankfully acknowledged this donation on behalf of the Society. He suggested that the latter should be free to use this money not only for crippled children but for handicapped, undernourished children as well.

Rotarian J. A. Webster said that he thought the amount for the dispensary might be \$100, the same as other years. He believed, however, that as the Rotarians had always been giving special attention to crippled children's work, that the amount of \$300 just voted should not be disturbed.

President Boulter pointed out that the \$100 for the Dispensary in the past had not usually been given until about the middle of February and it was open for any of the Rotarians by individual contributions to make up the usual amount. Secretary Bissett also pointed out that at the directors' meeting plans were discussed for raising further funds for charitable purposes after the beginning of the new year. The requirements of the milk fund was also brought up and reference made to the generosity of the Pure Milk Company in giving a quart of milk to the poor for each Rotarian who had visited the plant.
