## Mr. George Washington West

Innisfall's Pioneer Merchant Passes After Several Months Illness.

(Innisfall Province, Dec. 3rd)

On Sunday morning, about 6 o'clock Mr. George W. West passed peacefully away at his home in Innisfall after an illness of some months, at the age of seventy-four years.

The passing of Mr. G. W. West removes from our midst an outstanding pioneer and citizen of Innisfall. Associated with the settlement from its inception he has been a force to be reckoned with in the building up of the district.

Coming from Little York in Prince Edward Island as a young man, a school principal and a teacher by profession he soon made his presence felt. He came out from Calgary to what is now Innisfall but then known to the post office as "Poplar Grove" in the spring of 1891. A few settlers had already arrived. Mr. Constantine had built a general store and dwelling with a blacksmith shop on the west side of the track near where the Bawlf elevator stands. Constantine hauled his lumber and other material from Calgary by road. Mr. West was able to make the journey on a construction train. He acquired a corner lot from Mr. Chas. Murray, who had homesteaded the quarter section running from the cemetery corner to the Bryan farm on the west side of Alberta Street. Mr. West's site was the corner where Percy Hill has lived for some years. When the Calgary and Edmonton townsite trustees acquired a half (80 acres) of the Murray land, sale of lots on the west side of the railway ceased and the C. & E. company offered inducements in the way of free lots to those who had built on Wood Street. These included T. Detlor's dry goods, S. Dickson's butcher business, Massey-Harris implements, G. W. West, general store; a blacksmith's shop and one or two others. The Innisfall Hotel stood on the ridge opposite the West Store and with new settlers arriving every day a brisk business had developed. Mr. West moved onto the location where his store now stands; the original store forming the first portion of the present one and it was a small place at the time of his migration but has had periodical additions from time to time as business demanded.

Mr. West has also been an outstanding figure in public life, has served on the school board and town council and had a term as Mayor and was acting in this latter capacity when the town instituted its own lighting plant. He ran as conservative in a provincial election but was not successful. He was a delegate to the conservative election at Winnipeg and had a hand in nominating and electing Hon. R. B. Bennett as leader of the party in Canada.

An optimist of the aggressive type he met with much opposition in Innisfall in its early days but no matter what set-backs came along, he always came back smiling and willing to continue the struggle. He was a very big hearted man and a tale of woe or hardship always moved him to help out and he found it very difficult to say no when asked to supply necessities to needy settlers who had run out of cash. The late Mrs. West, who died some years ago, was also of a most generous disposition and gave a helping hand to many in their times of trouble and distress.

Of those doing business in Innisfall, Miss Catherine MacNeill, residing in the home at New Dominion on Sabbath morning August 23rd, Miss Mary MacNeill at the age of eighty-nine years, after an illness of several months.

The community has lost a sympathetic and loving friend, whose heart was filled with the spirit of Christian love. She will be missed in the home, where she was held with the deepest love and respect.

Miss MacNeill became a Christian during her early life and united with the Baptist Church at Long Creek where she was an honored and devoted member. She was a Malcom MacNeill, Raymond MacNeill, Daniel MacNeill, Kenneth MacNeill, Malcolm Lamont and William Potts.

A few years ago Mr. F. O. West joined his father in the business and the firm became G. W. West & Son and owing to the failing health of Mr. West the junior partner has controlled the store for some time.

Mr. West comes of pioneer stock. His grandfather, a Yorkshire man, sailed from Hull on the sailing brig Brilliant for P.E.I. The company on the ship comprised men of several callings — parson, school teacher, carpenters, builders, farmers, etc. After a passage of nearly three months, during which voyage they encountered a sinking ship and took off the passengers and crew which added to the Brilliant's already crowded state, taxing the little ship to the utmost. The Brilliant was lost on her next voyage. The Wests named the part of P.E.I. in which they located "Little York" after their old county in England.

The funeral was held on Wednesday afternoon from the Royal Theatre. Rev. C. E. Reeves, Rector of St. Mark's Anglican Church assisted by Rev. S. Pike of the United Church conducted the services. Mr. V. E. Anderson had charge of the funeral arrangements.

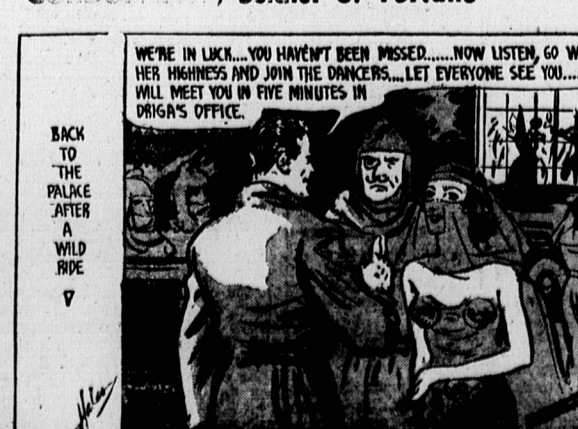
