IN MEMORIAM

MR. D. A. MACDONALD

The death occurred in Cambridge, Mass., Tuesday of Mr. D. A. MacDonald in his 63rd year.

Mr. MacDonald formerly belonged to Pisiquid, Prince Edward Island. He was a Liberal member of the Provincial Legislature nearly fifty years ago, representing the Fort Augustus district. Mr. MacDonald always took a deep interest in his native province and was largely instrumental in organizing the celebration held at Scotchtort in 1923 in commemoration of the landing of the Catholic pioneers in that part of the province. He was also one of the speakers on that occasion.

Mr. MacDonald was a man of splendid character and in every way a worthy representative of the people. He leaves to mourn one son, Prof. Leander A. MacDonald on the staff of the Latin and High School of Cambridge, Mass., also one daughter, Miss Annie, in Hollywood, California. The body will leave Boston today and will arrive at St. Andrews on Saturday evening. Requiem Mass will be celebrated in the morning and a funeral service will be held at the train on its arrival, after which interment will take place in St. Andrews Cemetery.

The body will be accompanied to the Island by Prof. MacDonald and Mrs. MacDonald, the latter being a sister of Mrs. (Dr.) W. J. P. McMillan of this city.

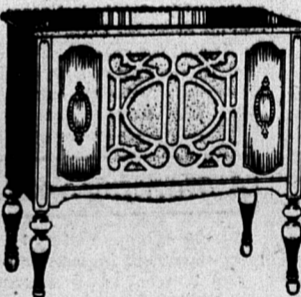

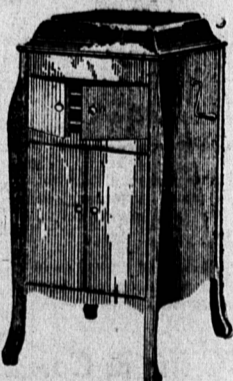
