IN THE HOSPITAL.—Miss Reta Coffin, of Souris, came to the city yesterday and was conveyed by the ambulance to the P.E.I. Hospital suffering from peritonitis and appendicitis. Miss Grace Mitchell accompanied the sick girl to the hospital where she was operated upon in the afternoon.

LAST DAY—Today is the last day on which entries can be made for the June 3 horse races. The classes are 2.19 trot and pace, purse \$200; 2.30 pace, purse \$100; and 2.24 trot, purse \$100. The entrance fee is 5 per cent, and entries are to be made with Mr. Charles Smallwood, Secretary. This race meeting has now become an annual fixture, and much interest is being taken in it.

LETTERS PATENT GRANTED.—At Wednesday night's meeting of the Executive Council letters patent were granted for the incorporation of the following companies, with the capitalization set against their names: The Garden City Silver Black Fox Co., Ltd., \$105,000; The Globe Fox Exchange & Agencies, Ltd., \$30,000; The Famous Silver Black Fox Co., Ltd., \$180,000; The Victor Silver Black Fox Co., Ltd., \$100,000, all of Summerside; Rogers-Stewart Ranches, Ltd. (subject to change of name) \$25,000 Charlottetown; Summerside Mink Co., Ltd., \$10,000, Summerside; L'Association Acadienne des Repens Non-Argentés Limitee, \$98,000, Summerside. Supplementary letters patent were granted to the Willow Hill Co., Ltd. to change its name to that of "The Willow Hill Silver Black Fox Co., Ltd." and to increase the stock from \$11,400 to \$450,000.

HORSE SOLD.—Mr. James Partridge has sold his valuable driver to Mr. Pope Mills, Charlottetown, at a handsome figure.—L.

STARTED SOWING.—Mr. Frank Egan, Mt. Stewart, was the first farmer in this section to sow wheat which he did on Tuesday the 19th. L.

FUNERAL.—The funeral of Mr. Colin MacNevin took place on Tuesday, May 19th, from his residence, Riverdale, to Argyle Shore Cemetery. The services at the house and grave were performed by the Rev. D. MacLean. Mr. MacNevin was in the 25th year of his age and leaves behind two brothers and two sisters.

SERIOUS OFFENCE.—Before Stp. Wright at Summerside, on Wednesday, Colin Ramsay of Port Hill, on information of Chief of Police Oaks, confessed to a violation of the Indian Act by giving liquor to an Indian, and fined \$50 and costs. This is the first charge of this kind proceeded with for some time and it is the intention of the authorities to follow this matter up if the practice is continued.—J.

APPOINTMENTS MADE.—At Wednesday's meeting of the Executive Council several appointments were made. The Sheriffs of the three counties were re-appointed, while Judge Blanchard was re-appointed member and Chairman of the Board of School Trustees, Charlottetown, for the ensuing term of four years. Francis Joseph Curran, Barrister of St. James Street, Montreal, was appointed Commissioner in Quebec for the administration of oaths for use in this province.

METHODIST DISTRICT MEETING.—The annual meeting of the Charlottetown District will be held in the Methodist Church, Cornwall, on June 3rd. The Ministerial Session will begin at 9.30 a. m. on June 3rd, the General Session at 2 p. m.; and in the evening, at 7.30, there will be an address by Rev. J. L. Dawson, B.A., followed by the celebration of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. On Thursday evening there will be a public meeting in the interests of a Sunday School work, when addresses will be given by the Revs. E. B. Styles and E. A. Westmoreland.

SOME EXCITEMENT.—Considerable excitement was caused yesterday morning when a horse owned by the Revere Hotel, and which was attached to a sloven, started to run down Great George street at a fast pace. The driver lost control of the horse and the animal, swinging around Crabbe's Corner into Grafton street, the sloven was brought into collision with the pony team of Mr. Aubrey Mutch. At the time of the accident, Mr. Ernest Farquharson was standing by the side of the wagon talking to Mr. Mutch. In the collision Mr. Farquharson was struck and slightly injured. The pony wagon was also damaged considerably. The runaway continued on his wild dash up Grafton street minus his driver, who had deserted meanwhile. Opposite White's confectionery store, another collision occurred, the animal in his blind escapade jumping upon the express wagon of Mr. Von Clure Gay with the result that that vehi-

cle crashed to the ground, damaged almost beyond repair. The driver of the express wagon escaped injury in some miraculous way, and even more wonderfully, so did the accompanying horse, which when rescued from its precarious position on the top of the express wagon, was found to be in a more sober frame of mind.

A NEW VESSEL.—Quite a new vessel is the schooner Beattie Crooks, which, as already stated in The Guardian, is at present in the harbor, discharging at Carvell Bros', having recently arrived with molasses from Barbados. Built in Liverpool, Nova Scotia, she was launched only last fall, and this is her first trip to this Island. The Beattie Crooks is owned in Liscombe by several parties, her skipper, Capt. Arthur Crooks, a courteous gentleman, being one of those who has an interest in her. Of 198 tons net and 241 tons gross burthen, the Beattie Crooks is 130 feet long and is a trim-looking craft. She is fitted in up-to-date fashion, being equipped with a gasoline engine for hoisting sails and anchor. There is a spacious cabin aft, neatly fitted up in oak and pine. Her maiden voyage was made from St. John's, Newfoundland, to Bahia, Brazil, with a cargo of fish. That voyage occupied 38 days, and at the beginning was remarkable for a spell of extremely bad weather. This was encountered in the Gulf Stream, which, so rough was the weather, the Beattie Crooks was eight days in crossing. During this severe trial of her sea-worthy qualities she behaved excellently and proved a steady and splendid sailer. From Bahia the Beattie Crooks went to Barbados, where she loaded molasses for Charlottetown. The trip from Barbados to this port occupied some three weeks, but for four days the schooner was lying in Port Hawkesbury, on account of the ice conditions around the coast of the Island being still heavy. The Beattie goes from here to Miramichi to load lathes for New York.

WINS MEDAL.—The present season in rifle shooting in Charlottetown has opened well, at least for Mr. G. Russell Beer, one of Charlottetown's prominent rifle shots. He has not had more than two or three practice shoots and already he has twice reached the century mark over the three ranges, 200, 500 and 600 yards. The first of these excellent performances Mr. Beer achieved at Kensington range on Wednesday afternoon. At the 200 yards he scored 33 out of 35; at 500 yards he made the possible 35, and at the 600 range he scored 33—a total for the three ranges of exactly a hundred. The merit of his achievement is enhanced by the fact that his score at 600 yards included a magpie and that he wanted bulls with both his last two shots in order to get the
