SUGAR CONSUMPTION - In the year which ended December 31st, 1919, our neighbors to the south consumed more sugar per capita than any other country in the world, except Australia, the Dominion of Canada coming close to the Great Republic in this regard. The total United States consumption for the year named was 4,760,001 tons, being nearly 34 cents a million more than for the previous year. This means 87 1/2 pounds for every unit of the population, really an enormous consumption. The increase over the previous year was largely made possible by the great increase in Cuban product, more than 670,000 tons. Beet sugar, sold to the amount of almost a million tons, or 527,000 tons more than in the previous year, the industry showing a wonderful development and revealing the infinite possibilities of development. The beet is a temperate nation crop, and Canada is almost as well situated as the United States in this regard. We have ample soil and a climate well fitted for the growth of this vegetable in quantities sufficient for all the needs of the population. But not a tithe of the quantity needed is grown at the present time, so that there is an excellent opportunity for the government to encourage the development of this industry.

THE BRANT - The C. G. S. Brant called at Summerside on Saturday on her work of supplying light houses.

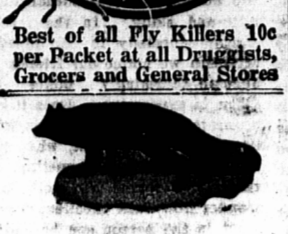

Major Bell, Dr. Hayes and other officers visited the Sanitarium on Wednesday and had a talk with the patients, who expressed their satisfaction at being transferred to St. Agathe, which has a continent-wide reputation as a sanitarium.

The Patriot announced last evening that: "The Dalton Sanitarium is being closed owing to the fact that for some weeks there have been only from twelve to fourteen ex-soldiers under treatment, and at no time can there be a sufficient number of patients of the D. S. C. R. to warrant the expense of keeping this large institution open for the Department."

"In fact the Sanitarium was only loaned to the D. S. C. R. and is being handed back to the Dalton Commission in October

"It was intended that the patients should leave this morning but it was found that the men were anxious to have a few days with their friends. Consequently their departure has been postponed until Tuesday morning next, and they have been given an opportunity to go home over the week end.

The patients are being transferred to St. Agathe Des Monts, P. Q., which is one of the leading sanitariums in Canada. It has been observed that cases from the maritime provinces have been doing exceptionally well in St. Agathe as that place is well inland and has a higher altitude and a drier atmosphere than the Maritime Provinces.

"Advantages taken of this change to give the men an opportunity of atmospheric changes, which it is hoped will prove very beneficial.

"A special Pullman car has been engaged to carry these patients to their destination. They will be accompanied by a medical officer, two trained nurses and two other escorts to look after their medical necessities and comforts. They

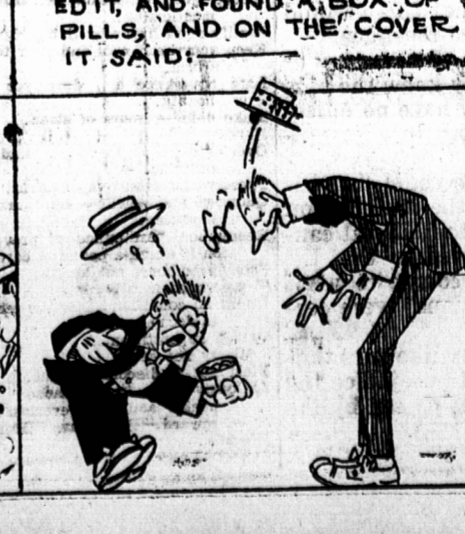
