He is by Jay Bird 1.16 in the 2.30 list, his sons have 411 by George Wilkes 2.22 by Hambletonian 10. Jackdaw is half brother of ALLERTON 2.091 (156 in the list, sons have 147). His dam Queen McGregor or by Ferguson McGregor has several in the list and is a sister of Pansy McGregor, yearling record 2.231, two year old 2.172. Of Admiral Dewey's get, 11 went in the list last year including Capt. George (4) 2.091, Scientia 2.111, Lord Dewey (2) 2.222, Lou Dewey (2) 2.271, Lord Calvert (2) 2.271, etc.

The great sires of speed last year were Todd, Bingara, and Admiral Dewey, all sons of Hingham 2.061. The great UHLAN 1.582 is half brother of COMMODORE'S sire, as is TODD, BINGARA and JOHN WARD 2.052.
