## Rev. Pius McDonald Lectures on the War

which commenced on March 21, 1918 he said, the German success was on a scale of about half that of Caporita. He gave a vivid picture of the misery of the refugees compelled to leave their homes and seek shelter in the back areas.

He described what followed in the various attempts of the Germans to pierce the lines at different points, all of which failed the final failure being July 15, 1918 which ended the second phase of the war.

The final phase opened on July 18th when Foch began his victorious onslaught on the German line and on a scale of about half that of Caporita. He gave a vivid picture of the misery of the refugees compelled to leave their homes and seek shelter in the back areas.

Besides outlining the history of the war the speaker told many interesting stories, and a few personal incidents.

At the close of the address, a unanimous vote of thanks was tendered the lecturer ably moved by Mr. Louis Wynne, and seconded in a happy address by Rev. G. C. Taylor, who paid a fine tribute to his fellow-chaplain, with whom he had but on terms of the closest comradeship.

Mr. C. Gavin Duffy in supporting the vote of thanks, said the only fault of the lecture was that the lecturer was too modest and had left himself practically out of the story, being content to deal only with a sketch of the war.

The lecturer fittingly acknowledged the vote of thanks and in reply to the last speaker stated his belief that any account of his own experiences would be found monotonous and uninteresting.

A very pleasing and well rendered programme was rendered before and after the lecture, which included a piano and violin duet by the Misses Hogan, reading by Mr. Gerald Madigan, song by Louis Dougan, choir chorists chorus "Tenting Tonight," solo, Mr. E. Arsenault, and a reading by Mr. A. McKinnon.

The National Anthem brought to a close a very enjoyable evening.

Meeting then adjourned.
