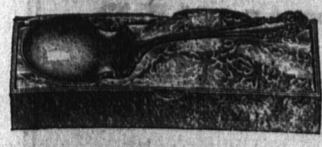

SUGAR has taken another drop, and a good one at that. On Wednesday afternoon a cut of twenty-five cents was made by the New York refiners, while the Canadian refiners, Montreal and Acadia, cut the price ten cents. This brings the United States and Canadian prices for the refined sugar about equal, as the Canadian were under the United States prices about fifteen cents prior to yesterday's reduction. These reductions seem peculiar in face of the fact that raw sugar advanced slightly on Wednesday in New York.—St. John Sun.

At the recent disastrous accident in Cranbrook B. C. caused by the falling of a building in course of erection J. A. McDougall, son of Alex. McDougall, Fairview, was among the injured having his right shoulder joint dislocated and his hip bruised. It is pleasing to learn, however, that he is recovering rapidly and none of the men were killed. The Cranbrook Herald thus describes the accident: At 10.50 last Tuesday May 23rd, the second story of the C. P. R. station, that was being jacked up to admit the construction of a third story, fell without a moment's warning catching all the men working beneath. For a moment consternation prevailed. From out of the cloud of dust that arose from the falling plaster in the debris, came the creaking of twisted timbers and cracking boards mingled with the agonizing shrieks of the injured men pinned like rats in a trap beneath a ruined mass weighing many tons. The cause of the accident is thus explained. The heavy second story was being jacked up to permit the placing of a third story on top of the first one. The work had been well done, notwithstanding the difficulty of the task, and each day saw the heavy load going higher. On Tuesday the desired height had been reached and studding had been placed in proper place. Then the blocking on which the top story had rested as it was being raised was taken out, one pile after another. The last one had been removed and the men were ready to proceed with the work of finishing, when there was a slight quiver of the upper story, then the men saw that the studding on the sides that held the load was moving slightly. That was the warning, but it came too late to allow the men to escape. For a second it wavered, and then with an awful rush it fell to the north, true and even, and rested on the side studding that in collapsing, fell one on the top of the other, thus making a solid foundation directly over the lower walls, and that saved the people below, as well as preventing complete annihilation of those working above. It is supposed that the direct cause was due to insufficient bracing for such a heavy weight, and when the mass got started it carried everything with it.
