Successful Islander In The West

CEAR, Alta., July 9.—At one of the best conventions ever held in the constituency of Ridstone, Allan Johnstone of Hardisty was elected Liberal candidate. The convention was held in Glockin's hall, Czar, and consisted of delegates from all over the constituency. Many former supporters of the Greenfield administration were present and as one man said, the number of present and former regents and councillors was notable. The convention was an open one and all Liberals were entitled to vote and take part in the general proceedings. It was presided over by Alex. Enzel, Cadogan, seconded by R. W. Lee of Provost. "That this convention of Liberals for the constituency of Ridstone nominate Allan Johnstone as the Liberal candidate to contest this constituency in the coming provincial general elections." This was carried with cheers. Mr. Johnson was born on January 4th, 1875, on a farm in Queen's county in the province of Prince Edward Island. He moved to Alberta in 1902 and to Hardisty in 1906 and organized the Johnstone Lumber company, of which he is manager. He is the owner of several farms and is considered very successful in all his business transactions. He is very popular and well known throughout the constituency. He was Hardisty's first mayor and held the office for several years and is at present president of the Hardisty district school board. Mr. Johnson referred to is a son of Mr. John Johnstone, Long River, New London.

(Continued from Page 1) provided by religious organizations. One of the reformatory institutions at present is the Maritime Home for Girls at Truro, which takes delinquent girls up to the age of 16. The record of this institution shows a remarkable degree of success, from 75 to 85 per cent having made good, many of them now occupying responsible positions as school teachers, stenographers and even as the heads of homes. For Protestant girls over 16 who come before the courts there are two alternatives, jail or the street, and as remarked by a Halifax Magistrate, either one means damnation. By the co-operation of the Anglican, Baptist, Methodist and Presbyterian Churches an effort is now being made to meet the case of these older girls. A property consisting of 200 acres of land, with a building suitable for caring for and training girls, has been provided at Coverdale, N. B., across the river from Moncton, which it is expected will be opened this fall. The capital cost of this property will be in the vicinity of \$65,000. Maintenance of the institution is practically guaranteed by the governments of the three provinces and the social service boards of the co-operating churches. The capital cost will have to be defrayed by public subscription and the work of securing the amount is now in hand. Mr. Fraser made a strong and very forceful plea for the direction of public opinion towards the great need and the great possibilities of this and similar institutions, emphasizing the reform, rather than the punitive method of dealing with this class of delinquents. Mr. Fraser spoke eloquently and earnestly and was listened to with rapt attention by the large audience. At the close the chairman, Mr. Pomeroy thanked him cordially in the name of the Rotarians for his excellent and informative address. The meeting closed with the National Anthem.

Charges Against Tennis People

LONDON, July 8.—Sporting Life today charges the committee directing the Wimbledon Lawn Tennis tournament, with shortcomings which, if not rectified, will lead to a decline in overseas entries and have other serious consequences. Aside from having lost international supremacy at the game, it adds, England has "lost caste to a much greater extent than is generally supposed by those unacquainted with the law tennis affairs of other nations." The committee is charged with imposing vexatious restrictions and not meeting the demands for uniformity of surface on the various Wimbledon courts. "Each year," says the writer, "one hears complaints from visiting players of the difference in pace between the centre court and the next best two courts." The Westminster Gazette says the 1925 Wimbledon meeting set a record in gate receipts, with "enormous" profits probably approaching about \$194,000.

VISITING FIRE-FIGHTERS WILL ARRIVE NEXT MONDAY AND TUESDAY EVENINGS

Upwards of Four Hundred of the Maritime's Finest Will Compete With Local "Huskies". Monster Parade on Wednesday Morning, Number of Them Headed by Their Own Bands.

Upwards of four hundred fire-fighters from a dozen different Maritime towns will arrive in the City on next Monday and Tuesday nights. They will be seen in a monster parade on Wednesday morning, a number of them headed by their own bands. On Tuesday afternoon they will meet in friendly competition on the Charlotte-Town Driving Park. The events at this meet will be very interesting. The team races will be run against time and will include running with hand apparatus coupling to hydrant, breaking hose and putting on nozzle. The ladder race is for teams of 10 men each with a thirty foot ladder which must be placed against a building for other support, the time to be taken when the ladder runner touches the top rung. The dashes, etc., will have men from the different departments all keen to win, while the tug-of-war will be as usual one of the most interesting events on the programme. It is expected that the largest crowd that ever witnessed athletic events of any kind here will be in attendance on Thursday afternoon.

10 HINTS FOR OLD HOME WEEK (By HARRY E. PORTER) Both auto and team drivers should read this carefully and act as it applies to respective vehicles. There is nothing expensive or elaborate and that is hard to do. All roads will be greatly congested with traffic of all kinds. Traffic perhaps unprecedented so protect yourself and others for a week at least. 1. All horse drawn vehicles that will be traveling out of town should carry a light at night. This is very important. The law compels autos to do so. 2. Auto drivers should start for the city or driver and go slowly. Set an example. 3. Pay strict attention to police officers and their signals. They will assist you in protecting yourself and others. 4. Observe traffic laws regarding intersecting posts or "silent policemen." Read the signs on them. 5. Park cars and teams close to the curb and reasonably close to the vehicle ahead. Do not park on main streets, it is against the law. 6. Use legal head light lens and dim lights at all times in the city. Keep license plates clean. 7. Go to the next intersection before making a complete turn. Do not turn on the middle of the block. 8. Have your brakes and horn working properly and use them judiciously. 9. Drive slowly and protect the man on the right. 10. In case of accident and injury, take a complete report to a doctor immediately, and act upon his instructions, after which report to the police. Endorsed by J. W. SHAW, Chief of Police

Coal Strike Is Marking Time

SYDNEY, N. S., July 9.—The Nova Scotia coal strike is still marking time. It is generally acknowledged that a large proportion of whatever development may follow the advent of a new Nova Scotia Government in what is expected to be about a week's time. Two local unions have asked the District Executive for more action leading towards a settlement, while another body terming themselves a "Policy Committee" and known by former district leaders as "Conservatives" are criticizing the executive. The strength of the unofficial "Policy Committee" is not known. Some fifteen more warrants have been sworn out in connection with strike activities. At Dominion today three violators of the Nova Scotia Temperance Act were sentenced to fines of two hundred dollars and costs or one week in jail. They chose the week. As the violators were of previous good character and apparently were not connected with wilful disturbances the Provincial Police, who made the arrests, did not press for a heavy sentence.

Britain Will Slash Unemployed Dole

LONDON, July 9.—There is going to be a cut of £6,500,000 in the unemployment dole under the new government bill and labor is furiously attacking the government. The Minister of Labor under this measure will regain his power of discretion to allow or disallow benefits already extended by which it is hoped to check the scandalous abuses and the glaring cases of married women drawing the dole and yet being unwilling to work. The effect of the bill will be to reduce the number of men and women on the dole and to encourage emigration which is today being seriously handicapped under the dole system.
