Henry Pierce, chairman of the District, who preached a very able sermon "The Cross and the World's Need." At the close of the worship he thanked the choir, which, under the training of Mrs. H.A. Browne, had rendered most excellent music. The anthems were beautifully rendered and the hymns were such as to inspire the congregation in worship. Mention should also be made of the special soloist, who so kindly came to assist in the re-opening. Messrs H.H. Aorn and M.S. Aorn of Souris were particularly fine in their selections and Mr. Walter Burdett of Strathcona, sang with great acceptance. The appearance of the church, within and without, has been greatly improved and the congregation is being congratulated upon its splendid work, and the fact that they now possess one of the prettiest churches in the country.
