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PRESENTATION OF MEDALS AT P.W.C.

(From Saturday's Evening Guardian) The closing exercises in connection with Prince of Wales College took place in the College Hall yesterday forenoon in the presence of a large assemblage. His Worship the Mayor (Ald. Charles Lyons) presided, and among others present were the Hon. J. A. Mathieson, Premier and President of the Board of Education; Hon. M. MacKinnon, Commissioner of Agriculture, Hon. W. S. Stewart, K. C., Hon. J. A. McNeill, Commissioner of Public Works; Mr. H. Campbell, Superintendent of Education; and Principal Robertson.

PARENTAL LUKEWARMNESS

The Principal in reviewing the work of the session said the graduates they were turning out on the present occasion were well fitted to play their part in whatever sphere in life they engaged in. In the Island the college was without the means of comparing its results, but comparison with outside institutions showed that the graduates of Prince of Wales held their own throughout the length and breadth of the Dominion. Their graduates went to other provinces and readily established themselves as schoolmasters, being greatly sought after. The reputation of the college had been great in the past, but not so great as it was going to be with all the additional advantages being bestowed upon it. The college was judged by the graduates it sent out; and they knew that those who went further afield maintained its reputation; but so also did those who came to it for their three years course and remained permanently in the Island as citizens. Proceeding the Principal said, unfortunately education in the Island as a whole, and in Charlottetown in particular, did not receive the support it should get from the community at large. Parents did not seem to interest themselves in the education of their own children, or in the education of other people's children as they should do. The neglect of the education of the rising generation was a very great tragedy in the commonwealth of the Island. It was the exception to find a parent or even a trustee sufficiently interested in the progress of the school to visit it even once or twice a year. Owing to the financial position of the Island they could not have the supervision of education they could desire. It was true the appointment of additional inspectors would enable them to cover more ground than formerly—and he hoped it was the beginning of greater developments—but when all was said the inspectors could only make infrequent visits, thus the college sent out every year a body of young people who were practically

left to their own resources in carrying on the education of the rising generation in the country districts. When they considered that fact they would readily believe that the training these young men and women had received in Prince of Wales College had left a permanent impression for good upon them. Apart altogether from the value of the college as a normal training school for teachers, it was of inestimable value as an institution where pupils from outlying districts could come and further their education. It would be an unfortunate thing if such pupils had no opportunity for a wider outlook such as the Prince of Wales College afforded. In conclusion the Principal mentioned that last year was a record year for the number of pupils enrolled there being 237, against 252 in the previous year. He expressed his regret that only a small percentage of these came from the elementary schools of the city. It seemed the city school children left at the age of thirteen or fourteen and were seen from that age to nineteen and twenty running about the streets of the city both day and night, having evidently nothing to do and no one seeming to exercise any control over them. The number of such young people who are thus idling away the springtime of life was simply appalling, and it was a great pity the parents did not appreciate the opportunities offered by the Prince of Wales College.

GREAT OPPORTUNITIES

The Chairman after having distributed the medals, diplomas and certificates, to the successful students, to the accompaniment of musical honors, congratulated the Principal and staff on the completion of another successful year. It was a pleasure to him to preside on such an occasion at the grand old institution that had made Prince Edward Island famous in every province in the Dominion. He could assure the students who had now finished their course, that wherever the name was known it was a passport to any young man seeking a position of trust and responsibility that he had come from Prince Edward Island and had been educated at Prince of Wales College. He would just like to say to the students, what he had said the previous day at another institution, that they happened to be born just at the right time, and were going out into a world of great opportunities. When he started life, as they were about to do, there were no wireless telegraphy, no telephones, no automobiles, no phonographs. To-day we had got all these things, and in a few years

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we will find them all in Prince Edward Island. (Applause). He congratulated Dr. Robertson and his staff on the result of the year's work and the Dr. for his excellent address. He counselled the graduates to pursue a course in life that would bring fame and credit to them and their Alma Mater. When they went out into the world never let them forget their old masters, and if they possibly could, let them try to bring credit and renown to the Island. (Applause).

TEACHING AS A PROFESSION

Premier Mathieson suggested that it might be advisable for the Prince of Wales and other institutions to drop the use of the terms "commencement exercises" at such closing exhibitions; it jarred him every time he read it, and he was sure there were many others who felt as he did. Addressing the students, he gave some reminiscences of the days when he was at college, and some of his experiences when he commenced life as a teacher. He considered there was no better means for a young man laying a foundation for a future career than by keeping school. It brought out of him the knowledge he had gained and enabled him to find out his deficiencies. He advised those who were to become teachers not to be discouraged at the outset of their career as there was no one who set out with the ambition of reaching the forefront of his profession who did not in the first three months, experience a certain amount of discouragement. By becoming successful teachers they would pay back in some degree the debt they owed to the community for the training they received at the Prince of Wales College. There was no greater duty they owed their masters and the college than that they should give a helping hand to those who were coming after them. (Applause).

CIVIS BRITANNICUS SUM

The Hon. W. S. Stewart, whom the Mayor introduced as an old graduate who had brought distinction to the college by carrying off the Gold Medal at McGill, compared the present conditions with those when he went to college, and said he was fully convinced that the province was making steady progress in the matter of education and that people were beginning to treat their families better in this respect than they had done heretofore. No young ladies were allowed to attend Prince of Wales College in his day. The fact that now they enjoy equal facilities for a good education with the boys was in itself a step in the right direction. He agreed with the Mayor in congratulating them on the times in which they live. When he was a boy going to college the outlook of the people in the Island was very limited and they were apt to grow up selfish, narrow-minded and with a circumscribed knowledge of men and affairs, knowing nothing of other provinces, their manner and methods of living. All they seemed to know about was oats, po-

tatoes and fish, and that was about all they cared about, and about all they talked and thought about in the old days. Now we lived in better times, we had a broader outlook, greater scope was afforded us for gaining knowledge and advancing in life. We realized we belonged to a great country whose opportunities were practically unlimited. In his young days there were few banks and these with small capital. Now they had many large banks in which there was invested a billion of dollars. Then there were few railways of not more than 25,000 or 30,000 miles. Now the country was intersected in all directions, and the industrial development of the country was going forward by leaps and bounds. These were things that invited young men to take their share in the development of our great resources. Not only did we now realize that we are part of a great country; but we also realize that we are part of a great empire. In the old days when the Roman Empire ruled the world, a man who could say "Civis Romanus Sum" could go anywhere and do anything; he felt that he belonged to a great commonwealth without its peer in the wide world, and that he had a right to feel proud of his citizenship. We, too, belong to a great empire, a vast commonwealth, which had yet to be properly consolidated, and in which we all must take our fair share in its maintenance, its defence and development; and we, too, should feel proud to be able to say like the Romans of

old "Civis Britannicus Sum." (Applause). Thus we could feel we were members of a vast Imperial Dominion in which we all possess the same rights, privileges, and opportunities; and that we could go its length and breadth all over the world, with the right to take any position that offered. (Applause). Mr. Stewart concluded by pointing out the great advantages that were now offered to young ladies in the classes for domestic science. Mr. Campbell briefly outlined the many advantages now offered those entering the teaching profession, and said the time was not far distant when that profession would be one of the most lucrative and honorable that could be pursued in the Island. Already some of the best schoolmasters who had sought opportunities in the west were arranging to return to the Island, and if the new graduates who are now free to seek positions did nothing to lower the profession, they would find in a very few years, schools would be raised to a higher position in the estimation of the public, and the salaries of the schoolmasters would gradually become higher.

The Hon. Mr. McKinnon briefly addressed the audience, and the proceedings closed with the National Anthem.
