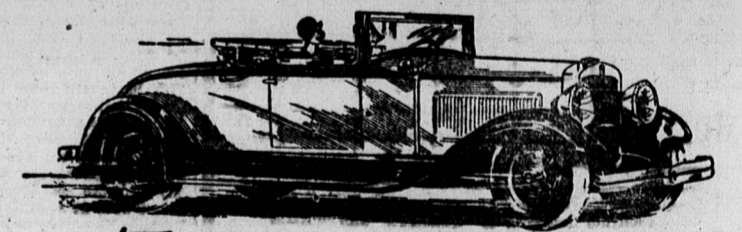
"Dear heart," she said, "when I am here and you are far away Let's think about each other at a certain time each day."
