Greyhound Wins Trotting Club Stake

PAWTUCKET, R. I., July 29 (AP)—E. J. Baker's Greyhound ran out in front in both heats of the First Division Trot of the Trotting Club Stake to win easily from a small field here today. Only four went to the post for this \$3,105 stake, including Greyhound's stablemate, Sister Mary. The trotting champion broke on top in each case and led all the way, winning both heats from Elbridge T. Gerry's Dale Hanover with Sister Mary third.

The first heat was timed in 2:03 1-4 and the second in 2:01 1-2, the latter being a new track record. Sep Palm, trainer and driver of the "Grey Ghost," kept the horse under restraint in the first heat but allowed him to pull away from the field going down the back stretch in the second mile. With 35 entries received for the four classes that are to be raced, Clifford (Jiggs) McDonald's first venture into the promoting end of the horse racing game, promises to be a real success at Northam Wednesday afternoon. Just glancing over the horses in each class one can almost visualize stirring blanket finishes in each heat, with rivalry being peaked to a high point between the horsemen as they endeavor to get their steeds in the best possible condition for the big four-day meet Old Home Week.

The Free-for-all Pace will again see Jane Azoff match strides with Aaron L. and Barney Hanover, in addition to Vesta Bars, San Ton Sully and others. But interest among Islanders will be centred on the first three. At Kensington Aaron L. had too much for the others, but both Hanover and Azoff will be out for a win tomorrow. Many are of the opinion that Aaron L. will again come through, but just as many feel that the fast pacing mare will be much harder to head in this case. And there is Barney Hanover to be taken into consideration along with the horses that did not race at Kensington. This pace may be the highlight on the card, but there are so many fast trotters and pacers in each race that almost anything is liable to happen.

Northam, a great track to race over, has always produced fast times but it would not be surprising if Wednesday would see the falling of some of the old marks.

Yankees Are Better Bargain In Slump

CLEVELAND, July 29 (AP)—The fourth-place New York Yankees are a better bargain to their prospective purchasers than a walk-away championship team would be. Take the word of Smith Davis, Cleveland broker who has been negotiating purchase of the Yankees and affiliated clubs, for a reported \$4,000,000, in behalf of a group including James A. Farley. Davis explained: "There's a hot contest for the American League pennant. The baseball public likes a contest and will pay for it."

The attendance figures tell the story. The Yankee Stadium pulped with 82,437 fans Memorial Day when New York and Boston met in a doubleheader. That's the third largest crowd in all baseball history. And only a week ago a crowd of 68,590 saw a twin bill there between the Yanks and Detroit. "This slump-inspired property," said Davis, is not confined to the Yankees' home acres. "Attendance at a three-game Philadelphia series amazed Connie Mack's town," he said. "Look at the Yankees in Chicago. A Friday night game drew 48,194 fans and Sunday's doubleheader attracted 39,537. That's appeal."

Davis believes the flag scramble is "the best thing that ever happened to the American League and baseball generally."

Jinx Again Cuts Down Detroit Tigers

NEW YORK, July 29 (AP)—The Tigers took it on the chin again today, dropping a 9-7 decision at Detroit to their jinx Philadelphia Athletics, to cut their American League lead to one game. The defeat was Detroit's 10th in 17 games with Philadelphia and left the Tigers only one game ahead of the idle Cleveland Indians. Rudy York slammed his 16th homer of the season.

NEW YORK, July 29 (AP)—After letting gallant old Carl Hubbell carry the whole load for seven innings, New York Giants came to life when he left for the showers today and nipped the National League-leading Cincinnati Reds 4-3. Unfortunately, King Carl didn't get credit for the victory. He had departed by the time Babe Young banged a double off the right field wall to drive in the deciding tally in the ninth inning.

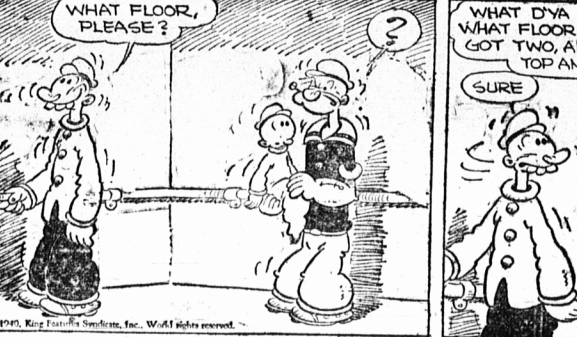

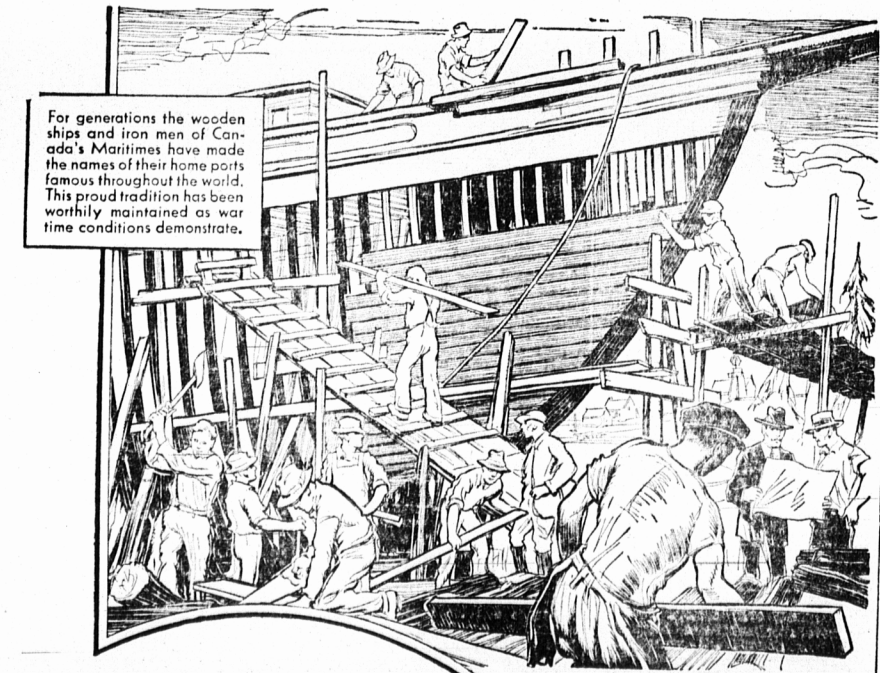
