French Ship Strikes Mine, Is Beached

R. C. C. S. Are Nerve Centre Of Canadian Army

BARRIEFIELD, Ont., Dec. 4—The nerve centre of the Canadian Army is on a rocky hill overlooking the city of Kingston, where, at Vimy barracks are the headquarters of the Royal Canadian Corps of Signals. And signals are the nerve system of an army.

The system consists of men and equipment. At Vimy barracks the equipment is assembled and across the road at Barriefield camp the human part of the nerve system for Canada's overseas army is in preparation. There some 1,000 officers and men, gathered from all parts of Canada, are in training for the signalling end of the expanding war-time army.

Signalling is one of the most specialized branches of the armed service and calls for technical skill along many different lines. It is the business of transmitting messages, orders and reports within an army.

Messages are transmitted by different means, depending on conditions. The signal corps must stand ready to carry written communications by dispatch riders, to transmit messages by wireless, wire telephone, wire telephony, by flags and by lights.

Many Trades Included

No less than 30 different and distinct trades go to make up the signal corps. Each trade calls for special knowledge and skill in the operation or maintenance of some kind of equipment.

The importance of signals has increased since the first Great War. Warfare as now conducted calls for more intelligence, closer co-ordination and consequently more facilities for transmitting communications.

The number of signal personnel in a present-day division is about three times the number employed in the last war. For instance last war the artillery had no wireless. Now each battery has about 20 wireless sets.

Generally wireless is used to a much greater extent than from 1914 to 1918. The mechanization of the army is partly responsible for this change. A more mobile force requires more directions.

Signalmen and Signalmen

Signalmen are to be distinguished from signalmen. Each battalion of infantry and each battery of artillery looks after its own communications within its own subdivisions. The members of the unit who attend to this are called signalmen.

In Peacetime And War

The Royal Canadian Corps of Signals functions actively in peacetime as well as in war and has peace-time duties. It maintains a system of wireless communication for the use of the Dominion Government between all parts of Canada.

Messages from a department at Ottawa to a branch of the Government service in another part of Canada usually are transmitted by the corps. It provides a service to the far north where no commercial telegraph service operates.

Recruits for the corps are selected with care in peacetime. They must have senior matriculation and their training requires three years, in which they learn much about the service in general as well as attain mastery of one or more special trades.

To meet the war situation, however, training is cut to bare essentials. Each man is given the essentials of one grade. The normal training period is three months. Many recruits, however, come to the corps with useful knowledge of telephony. These men require little more than the ordinary recruit training which teaches them to be soldiers gives them physical training and discipline.
