For any occasion or situation Harry has a quotation from his favorite poet at hand, and his knowledge of the plays is quite unusual. At odd times he turns to write poetry himself and he is always ready to produce a work for special issues of college publications and the like. Harry's collected poems were published by a group of student two years ago and now a second edition, composed almost entirely of his recent works has been presented to the college public and poetry lovers at large.

"Simple Rhymes for Simple Folk second series" is the title of the pamphlet which contains a picture of Harry himself, standing on the steps of the old Arts building, foreword by one of the students declares that the author has been recognized as the "territorial poet laureate" of the university. It continues: "Harry makes no pretension in the direction of technique or style. He simply aims to express his thoughts and sentiments—and what does it matter if, during this process, he occasionally overlooks mere considerations? This, after a hardly unprecedented in poetic circles."

The book contains eighteen poems some of the titles: "Will You Meet Me at the Fountain"; "Adieu to Professor of Classics"; "Hitch Your Wagon to Old McGill"; and "Kind to Your Stomach" show the poet's versatility.
