FUNERAL YESTERDAY—The funeral of the late Francis P. McCarron, took place yesterday morning at St. Dunstan's Cathedral and thence to the Roman Catholic Cemetery and was largely attended. Requiem High Mass was celebrated at the Cathedral by Rev. Father McQuaid and Rev. Father Maurice McDonald officiated at the grave. In token of Mr. McCarron's long and faithful services on behalf of the city, there was a fitting turn out of the civic authorities and officials. The procession was headed by the Police force, followed by the Band of the Fourth Regiment playing the Dead March, then came the Firemen, the Mayor and City Council Water and Sewer Commissioners, the Benevolent Irish Society and citizens. The pall-bearers were: Henry Smith Lyons, Dr. Bagnall, D. O'M. Reddin and W. W. Stanley.

THE POTATO SITUATION—Dealers confess that they do not know yet what to make of the potato situation. They think the market will remain where it is now until navigation closes and that after that the market may go up, says the Halifax Maritime Merchant. However, there are other opinions on that question. The American have been buying heavily in Prince Edward Island, notwithstanding a large surplus in the United States. It seems that the principal difficulty in the States is occasioned by the car shortage, for if reports are correct they have a surplus there of 450,000,000 bushels. There is said to be a surplus in Nova Scotia of 2,000,000 bushels, in New Brunswick of 2,600,000 bushels and Prince Edward Island of 3,000,000 bushels (although Quebec has a shortage of 2,000,000 bushels and Ontario is only normal). Under these circumstances one would expect a time to come when the market would settle, rather than advance this depending upon the subsidence of the outside demand.

LAURIER'S MANIFESTO

LONDON, Nov. 17.—The electoral appeal to overseas soldiers has been inaugurated by publication of Government and Opposition manifestos. The manifesto of the Government is brief but terse in statements, the main ones being that the only issue is enforcement of military service; that Laurier's declared intention not to proceed with conscription without referendum means six months' delay at least; that Union Government is neither Grit nor Tory, but supported by the Premier of every province, except Quebec. The manifesto of W. T. R. Preston in behalf of the Liberals is much more wordy. It eulogizes Laurier; promises to protect the soldiers' interests after war; charges profiteering in the best electrifying phrases; represents Laurier standing with the financial trusts, food, munition profiteers, and newly-made millionaires against him. The manifesto, in fact, promises everything, except immediate help in winning the war.
