EARL GREY LEAVES.—The Earl Grey left Charlottetown yesterday morning for Pictou with 19 tons of freight, express, 18 passengers and 25 sacks of paper and letter mail and docked about eleven o'clock. She will leave Pictou on return this morning.

MINTO ARRIVES.—The Minto arrived in Charlottetown yesterday morning from Pictou with 71 tons of freight, express, 25 passengers and 100 sacks of paper and letter mail and docked here at 11.40. She will leave this morning on return to Pictou.

TEMPERANCE LECTURE.—Victoria Division S. of T. has arranged with Rev. E. A. Westmoreland to deliver an address on temperance in Charlottetown on Monday next. The Reverend gentleman is probably the most forcible speaker on this subject in the province, dealing with the matter from the standpoint of individual responsibility as well as from that of public duty. When the transgressor is in his way, then the worse it is for the transgressor, no matter who he is, whether church member, politician or moral mountebank. Those who have the pleasure of hearing him will certainly learn something. There will be no admission fee. Reserve Monday next for this lecture in Wright's Hall, 7.30 p. m.

DEMONSTRATIONS.—During the first three days of the Short Course, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, January 27th, 28th and 29th, Pro. Carey, Expert Apple Packer, will give demonstrations in the packing of apples in boxes. About thirty barrels of apples have been secured and everyone who is anxious to learn packing will be given the opportunity. It will assist in the arrangement of the classes however, if all those who would like to receive special instruction in this subject would forward their names to the Department of Agriculture at once. Boxes make a cheaper and a better package than barrels. They carry better and bring a better price in the British, as well as in the home market, so that every fruit grower should learn to pack apples in boxes.

INWARD TRAINS.—The southern accommodation arrived in Charlottetown today at 10.15 a. m., on time and the Cape Traverse accommodation at 10.10 a. m., on time.

MINTO AIDS.—A recent issue of the Canadian Countryman contains a synopsis of a few pages taken from the "Log Book" of a missionary to the Eskimos and is of interest in this Province as the S. S. Minto, now on the Charlottetown-Pictou route was in close touch with the work done. The missionary says:—Mr. Sainsbury and the Hudson Bay Company were most kind to me throughout my illness, (blindness through exposure), during which time I did my best not to hinder the work. Until I was able to get up, I taught the people in my own room. By July 2nd I had gained sufficient strength to venture on another trip, the ice still being a solid barrier for at least fifteen miles, but I was forced to return on the fourth day, being too ill to remain. On August 11th the Hudson Bay Company's ship arrived, bringing the Rev. J. W. Bilby, who tried to relieve me by an operation. As I was too ill to stay at the place, I was ordered home for treatment. It was not until September 10th that I reached the Government steamer "Minto," stationed off the Nelson River, with a doctor on board. I was transferred to the vessel and underwent three operations. After six weeks and five days aboard, I was transferred to the "Beothic," and landed in North Sydney, November 10th, eighty-five days after leaving Lake Harbour. I was carried about 2,000 miles out of my way in order to get back to civilization. In the ordinary course of events, the journey would have been completed in about nine days."
