NEW YORK, N. Y., Feb. 23.—Raw sugar was easier today under increased offerings of nearby supplies while demand was held.

Prices declined 2 points to the base of 230 delivered with sales of 7,000 tons of Cuban from store at this level. Prices of Porto Rican nearby and 7,000 tons of local refined, and there appeared to be more available at the same level with buyers showing no further interest.

The day's business aggregated 49,400 tons, including nearly half in the form of exchanges from the March to later positions. March closed at 242 1/2, July 100, September 100, December 110, January 110, 1931.

The refined market was unchanged today for the first time this year, the ruling of raws seemed to discourage buyers and demand was light.

MONTREAL, Que., Feb. 23. (By the Canadian Press)—Atlantic Sugar and Southern Canada Power, making their first bond issue since this year, showed wide breaks today on the Montreal Stock Exchange. Otherwise the market gave a listless display with losses in the afternoon.

Atlantic Sugar sold off 4 points at 18 1/2 and Southern Canada Power off 3 1/2 at 20 1/2. The market was shown by amalgamated up 1/2 at 9 1/2; ecol Frontenac, up 1/2 at 10 1/2; and Steel of Canada, up 1/2 at 11 1/2.

C. P. R. was down 1/4 at 7 1/2; Nickel, 1/2 at 9; National Steel Car, 1/2 at 9 1/2; Smelters, 1/2 at 8 1/2; Cement 3/4 at 6 1/2; Cookshut, 1/2 at 5 1/2 and B. C. Power 1/2 at 22 1/2.

The bond market was confined to sales of victory 1934's of which \$12,000 changed hands at \$100.15 to \$100, closing at the latter figure for a net loss of ten cents.

Sales on the exchange, at 3,410 shares, compared with 2,356 yesterday and 67,733 on the corresponding day of last year.

NEW YORK, N. Y., Feb. 23.—Stocks slipped slowly backward today in the quietest trading since February 9. Prices sagged fractionally at the opening, recovered all their lost heart close, dropping to an unhealthily weak close. The last hour was the most active period. Net losses in many instances ranged from 1 to more than 5 points, with the turnover 1,281,213 shares.

Brokerage houses which have been taking the view that the worst of the bear market was over found ground for ending the reaction consolidation of the recent advance, pointing out that the list had still to complete a normal technical reaction from the mid-month rally.

Nevertheless, buying support was uninspiring, for shorts appeared to have resumed their campaign fully and there was nothing in the days' news to stimulate demand in the market of another upward flurry. Further profit taking was doubtless a factor.

Auburn Auto had a 15 point break, although the market was not seriously troubled by the change in fortunes of this volatile issue. Union Pacific's loss of more than 6 seemed to have some weight, since it followed publication of a poor January earnings statement. The last hour, losing 4 1/2 and 2 points, respectively, General Motors, Du Pont, Case, American Tobacco, American Can, New York Central, C. & W. and Western End, U. S. Steel finished 2 to 3 1/2 lower. Preferred stocks were mixed but with a tendency toward heaviness.

With the French franc comfortably below the gold point and Swiss and Dutch rates tapering off, the question of addition gold shipments assumed, at least temporarily, less importance.

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Canadian Industries Cut Operating Expenses

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., Feb. 23.—Net operating income down 6 1/2 per cent from the previous year, \$3,433,540 against \$3,712,044, is shown in the annual report issued today of Canadian Industries, Limited, for the year ended Dec. 31, 1931.

After payment of preferred dividends and provision for taxes, depreciation etc., earnings on the common stock were shown at \$4.65, against \$5.09 on a slightly lesser number of outstanding shares the preceding year.

Preferred dividends absorbed \$325,000 leaving a balance of \$3,108,540, or \$102,553 in excess of common dividends which absorbed \$3,005,987.
