There was a new moon Tuesday, Sept. 30th at 12.57 a. m.

CIVIL SERVICE REFORM BEFORE THE CABINET.

OTTAWA, Oct. 3.—Civil service reform as covered in certain features of the report of Sir George Murray, is now before the cabinet. The whole question has been under consideration by Hon. W. T. White, Minister of Finance, and it is quite probable that several of the more important suggestions of the English expert will be acted upon in the immediate future. These refer to the failure of the present system to relieve members of the government of a vast amount of detail and routine work which, according to Sir George Murray, ought to be discharged by subordinate officials, and the necessity for a more up-to-date method in the preparation of the estimates. In regard to the latter it is felt that the present system is in some respects unsound more particularly in respect to the time-honored practice of voting initial appropriations without having definite information as to the ultimate cost of the work to be undertaken.
