

Rumanian Jews Banished into Ukraine ghettos

BUCHAREST, Oct. 28 (AP)—Jews living in Bessarabia and Bucovina are being banished by Rumanian authorities into ghettos established in the neighborhood of the Bug River in the Russian Ukraine, the Rumanian news agency Bador announced today.

Before Rumania was partitioned by Russia and Hungary it was estimated that at least 385,000 of Rumania's 850,000 Jews were living in Bessarabia and Bucovina, the parts annexed by Russia last year. However, there was no official estimate of the number of Jews living there now.

The change involves transfer of Jews to new homes 100 or more miles east of their present domicile. A part of the lower Ukraine, with Odessa as its capital, recently was declared a Rumanian administrative district.

C. N. R. Head Completes Tour Of Inspection

MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 28 — R. C. Vaughan, president of the Canadian National Railways, having completed a thorough inspection of all the system properties, east and west, returned to headquarters on the termination of his western tour. The inspection was accompanied by officers of the company and members of the board of directors.

Mr. Vaughan said "we have made an inspection of the physical properties of the system, its roadbed, equipment, its shops, its hotels, steamships, telegraph and express facilities. We have conferred with supervisory staffs and have met the workers at all grades of service. Meetings have been held with business men in the various cities, lumbering, mining and other forms of production. The objective has been to determine by personal contact that everything possible is being done by the railway to ensure continuity of prompt and efficient transport service to the nation in this period of crisis.

The railways carry more than two thirds of the total production of the Dominion, and the maintenance of their efficiency is absolutely vital.

Canada's productivity has risen to new heights in very many lines of effort. In general, the volume of business is greater than at any other period in the history of our

country, although the western Canadian grain crop of 1941 was disappointing.

A Matter of Pride

"It has been a matter of pride to railwaymen that in the first two years of the war they have carried the troops, the munitions, the supplies and the products of farm and factory along with vast quantities of material for construction without a tie-up of any kind due to shortage of facilities, to labor disarrangements or any other cause. It is certain after these lengthy inspection trips that this fine record of the railways will continue. They have not yet reached the maximum of service which they can give in spite of the largely increased traffic they are handling.

"The outstanding impression one obtains on a ten thousand mile journey through the nine provinces of Canada is the amazing resolu-

tion which the war has brought to our national economy. The huge new factories which have had to be created for chemical and other munitions of war have passed from the construction and organizing stage into output. In the shipyards on the Atlantic and the Pacific, and on the great lakes keels for new freighters and the war vessels have been laid. When we were at Vancouver this month the first of the new freighters was launched. Further north, at Prince Rupert, the Canadian National shipbuilding plant and drydock are also busy on the creation of freighters and minesweepers.

"Other plants of the Canadian National are busy on work. I have had an opportunity of talking to many hundreds of Canadians through the east and through the west, people from the non-war stocks which have made Nor-Am America what it is today and nowhere did I find that resolu-

20,000 firms Seek licenses

OTTAWA, Oct. 27 (CP)—Twenty thousand applications for licence flooded the offices of the licensing records division of the

Warline Prices and Trade Board in the last three days of the past week, but the director of licensing C. R. Morphy said he wasn't one bit worried.

"The faster the applications come in, the better," he said today. "We expect that some 200,000 manufacturers and dealers in food, feeds, clothing, and footwear will be under licence before the Dec. 1 deadline. Window licence certificates and identification cards will be in the mail to the early applicants the first week in November."

Referring to cases where application forms had been delivered to persons or firms not subject to the present licensing order, Mr. Morphy said that a businessman could readily determine whether or not he should apply for a licence by reading the list of commodities on the application form.

"If your business handles or
